### MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER 18, 2009, IPNA MEETING

### WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION OF NEWCOMERS

Adam Stillman filled in for **Lisa Burnette** who could not attend the meeting. He asked newcomers to introduce themselves and **Scott Steinbach** did.

#### **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

- 1. Adam reminded everyone that if you suffered flood damage from the recent storms, you might qualify for FEMA assistance. For more information go to www.disasterassistance.gov by November 23.
- 2. Pat Westrick announced that porch parties will begin again in February. Please contact her if you would like to host a party. She also shared that the Horizon Theatre is offering discounts to Inman Park residents for *The Santaland Diaries* performance on December 1 and 2. She will also post this information on the Yahoo Group.
- 3. Oreon Mann announced the Book Club will not have a meeting in November or December. However, the Book Club holiday party will be hosted by Patty McGuigan-Robinson on December 2 at 814 Virgil St. Please bring a covered dish to share and a book for a book exchange.
- 4. Richard Westrick asked neighbors to help with a tree planting on Saturday, November 21.

#### MINUTES OF LAST MEETING

A motion to accept the Minutes from last month's meeting was made, seconded, and carried.

#### POLICE OFFICERS' REPORTS

**Sgt. Brent Schierbaum,** head of the Inman Park Security Patrol, reported that home burglaries are down, however, we have had two commercial robberies. He asked everyone to be on the lookout for two white males with a red car. Car break-ins continue to be a problem. Little Five Points has the highest number of incidents. A recent trend has been people stealing catalytic converters and batteries from cars (including cars parked at Roger Jordan's Garage). These thieves should be easy to spot since they have to be under your car to remove the parts. He reminded everyone not to leave valuables in your car.

He then gave a report about IPP **Officer Welch** catching a man who had been a suspect for several robberies including an incident at the Irwin Street Market. **Investigator Roy** arrested **Sean Wilcox**. He had been acting suspicious and casing houses. He was carrying a loaded 22-caliber gun when he was arrested. Excellent work by these officers.

Sgt. Schierbaum reiterated that you should always call 911 first and then call the IPP. If you get the voicemail for IPP, please leave a message with the time you called because their phone does not have a time stamp. Please let him know if you see panhandlers in the retail and/or residential areas because we want to keep the neighborhood as friendly to residents and visitors as possible.

**Bob Sandage** announced the Officer of the Month. Officer **Ari Bleifeld** will receive a \$50 gift certificate from IPNA in recognition of his outstanding work. This month Officer Bleifeld arrested a man who was wanted in DeKalb and Fulton counties. He also found two graffiti taggers and ar-rested them. **John Floyd** asked what would happen to the taggers. Sgt. Schierbaum explained they spend the night in jail and then are released.

Major Propes was able to report on a Crimestoppers story that aired last week. Because neighbors had taken photographs of the suspect prowling and burglarizing, Anthony Biggs was identified and arrested. He is a repeat offender with four previous burglary and rape convictions. Please participate in Courtwatch so we can ensure he remains behind bars.

### **ELECTED OFFICIALS REPORTS**

There were no elected official present. Adam Stillman reminded everyone to vote on December 1.

### IPNA OFFICERS' REPORTS

#### PLANNING - Bill Goodman

Bill was not able to attend. **Adam Stillman** reported for him. He has wrapped up the survey. There were 360 respondents. He will be compiling the results to share soon.

### **ZONING - VP Amy Higgins**

The restaurant proposed for the corner of North Highland Ave. and Colquitt Ave. (the previous Casbah space) was on the agenda tonight but the owner needs another month to prepare. He has some parking challenges because of limited space. There was an immediate neighbors' meeting on November 4 about rezoning the lot adjacent to this commercial building (479 North Highland Ave., the lot where a house burned down a couple of years ago) and they voted against rezoning.

**NPU-N - Megan Holder** is still in Hong Kong. **Jonathan Miller** reported for her. Project Greenspace (www.atlanta-greenspace.com) is a plan to update the city's greenspace plan (which has not been updated since 1993). The project has three goals: grow, manage, and build capacity. The City of Atlanta does not have as much green space as other comparable cities. The green space that does exist is not spread equitably around the city. The southern and western sides of the city do not have adequate parks. **Danny Feig-Sandoval** made a motion to support Jonathan's support of Project Greenspace. The motion was seconded and carried.

#### PUBLIC SAFETY - VP Bob Sandage

Bob has been focusing on events to raise awareness and money for the Inman Park Patrol. He thanked the new neighborhood restaurant Pure Taqueria for their support. They raised \$1,200 for Security Patrol.

He announced The Santa's Safety 5K Run will be on Sunday, December 13, at 10:30 a.m. They are still looking for sponsors,

volunteers, and participants. There are all levels of sponsorship. He stressed the most important element is registering participants. The goal is to have 200-250 participants. Please register in advance so they can plan accordingly. All revenue after costs will go to the Security Patrol.

#### HISTORIC PRESERVATION - VP Adam Stillman

Adam reported the cell phone tower in Little Five Points has been installed. IPNA has an appeal that will be brought up in court in January. Please stay tuned for more information.

The neighbors at 158 Elizabeth St. are presenting a Type III application. They are putting on a new roof and want to make a change from asphalt to metal. They want to use metal for environmental reasons. They need a Type III because there is no proof that the roof had ever been metal. The existing material is grandfathered in. The immediate neighbors voted to support the metal roof. A motion was made, seconded, and approved to support the immediate neighbors' decision for the Type III application.

**Rick Bizot** presented a Type III application for 839 Lake Ave. since **Adam Stillman** is the architect on the project. The neighbors want to add a rear addition to a single-story house. There are no changes to the historic characteristics of the house. There was unanimous neighbor support of the application. **Jonathan Miller** asked about potential UDC pitfalls with the design but Adam is confident he has addressed everything. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to support the immediate neighbors' decision.

#### TREASURER - VP Cameron Childress

Motions were made, seconded and passed to approve the following budgeted expenses over \$1,000:

Public Safety \$12,905.81

Beautification \$1,203.79

Traffic Calming \$9,015.00

Cameron reported he received really nice thank-you notes from Grady High School and Inman Middle School for our support.

He also reported that the neighbor-hood has approved up to \$5,000 to fight the cell phone tower. We have now spent that money. **Regina Brewer** and **Lisa Burnette** will talk more about this issue at next month's meeting. We need to decide whether or not we should continue to fight this.

We have now negotiated a fee of \$2,700 a year to rent the space from the Church for the IPNA meetings. This is in line with recent years' rent. This money is not in the budget so we will have to vote next month to approve paying last year and this year.

Martha Porter Hall from the Historic Fourth Ward Conservancy shared plans for a new 35 acre park that is part of the Beltline development. The first phase of construction, the building of a stormwater retention pond that will become the water feature in the park, is being funded by the Department of Watershed Management. The Conservancy has begun fundraising to hire a consultant to help them develop a long-term plan for the rest of the park. If you would like to help, please go to the website (www.h4wpc.org) to make a donation. They have asked for a \$1,000 donation from IPNA.

### SECRETARY - Stephanie McCaa

Nothing to report.

### PRESIDENT - Lisa Burnette

Adam Stillman reported for her. He reminded everyone that the dates of April 23-25, 2010, have been chosen for Festival. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the dates for Festival as well as the location of Festival in Inman Park.

### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

**Traffic Calming: Danny Feig-Sandoval** reported that the landscape plans are available for viewing. Also, work is now starting on the traffic calming bulb-outs on North Highland Ave. If you have any questions about traffic calming, please e-mail him.

### **NEW BUSINESS**

**Jonathan Miller** announced the At-lanta Beltline's quarterly briefing will be on Monday, November 23, at the APS Auditorium. He also thanked IPNA for their generous donations to the Mary Lin Elementary School.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

There was no old business.

### MOTION TO ADJOURN

The next IPNA meeting is December 16 at 7:30 p.m.

There was a motion to adjourn. Adam Stillman adjourned the meeting at 8:25 p.m.

She was best known for the beautiful roses all over her yard. She also grew the most magnificent snow ball tree. She would share clippings from the tree and her other plants with family and friends. That was just one of the ways she shared her love. Maybe that was why her middle name was "LOVE" because she always loved people. You could expect a big hug, kiss, and a beautiful smile from her.

While growing up, Ruby worked in the fields picking cotton to earn money to help provide for her family. She had also worked for Scripto, White Head Die Casting, and Sofie May Candy that used to be located on North Avenue (she would always bring home samples of their peanut brittle!) She was a lady with many talents. There was nothing she couldn't do when she put her mind to it.

She loved ALL her children, grand children, great grand children and great grand children unconditionally. She would pray for us all and wanted nothing more for everyone to get along and be happy. She was a Godly woman and you always knew what she stood for. She was pure, kind hearted, and always tried her best to set a great example for her children, grand and great grand children.

### A BRIEF INTRODUCTION TO ZONING, ITS ACRONYMS AND PROCEDURES

Does zoning terminology seem like alphabet soup to you? Ever wonder how the Zoning Review Board differs from the Board of Zoning Adjustment? What's NPU-N's relationship to IPNA and how do our votes at IPNA meetings impact policy decisions? OK, so you may not have lost sleep pondering these questions but I think a quick outline of how zoning affects our neighborhood might be useful – especially for folks who are new to Inman Park or new to Atlanta. So, here it goes:

Zoning issues in the City of Atlanta are reviewed and ruled upon by either the **Zoning Review Board** (ZRB) or the **Board of Zoning Adjustment** (BZA). The Zoning Review Board consists of nine members appointed by the Mayor and City Council. The ZRB reviews property re-zonings and special use permits (such as those needed for festivals and parades). The Board of Zoning Adjustment consists of five mem-bers and reviews applications for variances and special exceptions to the City Zoning Ordinance. Both Boards take the recommendations of the relevant Neighborhood Planning Unit (NPU) and the Board of Planning (BOP) into consideration when making a judgment. Both also consider the testimony given at hearings.

Liquor license applications are reviewed and ruled upon by the **License Review Board** (LRB). The LRB functions as part of the Atlanta Police Department and consists of five members. The LRB's recommendations for each liquor license application are forwarded to the Mayor for a final ruling. The LRB also conducts hearings on any charges brought against a licensee.

Neigborhood Planning Units (NPUs) are citizen advisory councils that review and provide feedback to the Mayor and CityCouncil on zoning, land use, planning proposals, and liquor licenses. The NPU system came into being in 1974 to provide citizens a more active role in determining Atlanta's future development plans. There are 25 NPUs in Atlanta. Inman Park is part of NPU-N along with Candler Park, Lake Claire, Druid Hills, Poncey-Highland, Cabbagetown, and Reynoldstown. NPU-N also includes the L5P Business Association, the L5P Community Center and the Ponce Corridor East Business Association. NPU-N takes the recommendations of the relevant neighborhood association and/or business association into account when establishing a position on a particular issue or proposal.

IPNA (or, more specifically, the IPNA Zoning VP) conducts an immediate neighbors meeting whenever a business within the neighborhood applies for a liquor license or a property owner applies for a variance or rezoning of his/her property. When reviewing a liquor license application we pay special attention to issues of parking, live or outdoor music, security plans for establishments open after midnight, and proposed strategies for minimizing litter and vagrancy. "Immediate neighbors" are defined as those within a 300 foot radius of the property in question.

IPNA is invited to review zoning related applications in adjacent neighborhoods when the properties in question are within 200 feet of our boundary. We are also given an opportunity to provide feedback for projects proposed within the Beltline Overlay District which overlaps the Inman Park and Old Fourth Ward border. A group of members and friends of Inman Park United Methodist Church are planning to go to Feira Nova, Brazil in March, 2010 to build a simple, decent and affordable home with a family in need. The Habitat for Humanity project is part of a larger effort to provide 100 homes for single female headed families in this small, rural, agricultural town near Recife, in Northeast Brasil. The mothers work at a manioc flour factory, where they receive pennies per kilo for grating the manioc by hand. An added challenge is that they also rent their current, unsanitary and some-times unsafe homes from the flour factory, so their take home pay is very small.

This is not a hand out, but a hand up. A Feira Nova family will purchase the home using a zero percent mortgage. Due to the sweat equity that the family will contribute to their home, as well as the cheap labor provided by the Inman Park group, their mortgage will be lower than their current rent. Besides affordability, the simple block homes will be dramatically healthier for the mothers and their children.

I think we did a pretty good job. (Was that self-serving? Yeah maybe a little.) And all of us wish to return in 2010. I hope you will allow us to represent you again in 2010.

We had no IPNA-specific items at NPU-N's November meeting. Alright, maybe one. NPU-N did vote to support the Inman Park Festival. I told the Board the Festival would be as cool or cooler than last year. It was a close call, but they bought it. Alright, it was never in doubt, but it is hard to make these articles in-teresting.

Instead, the UDC looks at design features and it only takes about half the time that a variance takes. So next time someone complains about the UDC process, please try to remember that it could be a lot worse.

### **DECEMBER PUBLIC SAFETY NEWS**

From time to time, those of you who are members of the Yahoo Group will get a message from **John Hines** regarding crime statistics. I have mentioned it during IPNA meetings, but would like to show my appreciation for John's work in print in *The Advocator*. John is now our Statistics Manager for the Public Safety group.

I would like to expand on John's recent Yahoo posts regarding recent crime statistics.

Beat 604 and 605 are Atlanta Police Department beats that include Inman Park, Poncey-Highlands, Candler Park, and possibly other areas. There is no data published by the APD that **isolates** Inman Park from the other neighborhoods in terms of stats. John goes to painstaking detail on a regular basis to sift through the data to extract crimes in Inman Park and put them into different categories of crime.

For the full year of 2008 and through October of 2009, total violent crime in areas of Beats 604/605 **outside** of Inman Park went from 1.8 violent crimes per month to 5.6 violent crimes per month – a 305% increase!! Violent crime **within** Inman Park went from 2.6 violent crimes per month to 2.7, an increase, but much, much less of an increase than our surrounding neighbors.

1. In 2008, 65% of the violent crime in Beats 604/605 was within Inman Park. Thus far in 2009, that number is down to 32%. About

- 16% of the violent crimes in Beats 604/605 result in injuries to the victim. What this means is that 10 fewer people have been injured in violent crime in Inman Park in 2009 than what would be expected from analysis and interpolation of the data from 2008.
- 2. Of course I may be a little biased, but I can't find many other reasons for our improvement versus surrounding neighborhoods than our very own Inman Park Security Patrol. Think about this for less than \$1 per day for those participating in Security Patrol, we are keeping 10 fewer people from sustaining bodily injury. Seems like a fair price to me! But, we still have less than 50% of the residents in our neighborhood contributing, so PLEASE ask your friends and neighbors if they belong, and if not, encourage them to do so. We have instituted a formal "Officer of the Month" program to recognizes an IPSP Officer for outstanding performance during the month with a gift card given at each IPNA meeting. Our inaugural member for the month of November 2009 was Officer Ari Bleifeld. Officer Bleifeld was instrumental in the arrest of two sneaky taggers vandalizing the Inman Park Pool on the night of November 1. Big kudos and thanks to Officer Bleifeld!

If you will be traveling for the holidays, PLEASE go to www.inmanpark.org click on the Public Safety link and fill out the Vacation Request Form. The requests are not automatically answered via e-mail, but rest assured the Inman Park Security Patrol will be physically checking sll your doors and windows for any signs of intrusion at least once per shift.

Lastly, we are in the final stages of organizing the Inman Park Santa's Safety 5K Run/Walk to be held on Sunday, December 13 at 10:30 a.m.. By the time you receive this issue of *The Advocator*, the race will have just occurred, but we will be sure to give you a final recap in next month's edition. Stay safe during the holidays!

### LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS TEAM UP AGAINST IVY, PRIVET FOR CASH

On November 7, teams from local organizations and schools came out to compete for prize money as part of an ongoing effort to rid local parks of invasive plants and debris. By the end of the second annual Park Renewal Day, hosted by Renewal Design-Build, the DeKalb County Parks Department and City of Decatur, competitors at Dearborn Park, were weary from pulling up ivy and privet, but had a real sense of accomplishment and community.

Decatur Mayor Bill Floyd and DeKalb County COO Keith Barker assisted in the

scoring of the teams' plots. The prize money, donated by Renewal Design-Build, was given to the five highest-scoring teams. The grand prize of \$1,000 went to the Midway Woods Neighborhood Association - appropriately named "Ivy League" - while two teams from Decatur High School students won 4th and 5th places. Groups from Hands On Atlanta and All Souls Fellowship also took home top prizes. A celebration of food and music from a local Decatur band, The Grits, followed the cleanup.

The success of this public/private initiative has incited talks of expanding the event into other areas of Atlanta and to other parks. "In just a few hours, we saved over 100 old growth trees from being strangled by invasive plant species, and prize money was put back into the community," says Renewal CEO and Park Renewal Day co-founder, **Peter Michelson**. "It's amazing what can happen when you give people an incentive."

And, the proof is in the park. "It's great to see what the community's efforts have brought to Dearborn Park," says Mayor Bill Floyd. "If you haven't walked through, do so."
