About the 2013 Design

CREATED BY COOPER C. PIERCE, AIA, LEED AP

The talent behind this year's design was discovered very close to home. An Inman Park resident for more than two decades, Cooper Pierce and his wife, Robbie Whyte-Pierce, today live in their second home in the neighborhood. After purchasing their first house in 1992 and renovating it, they designed and built their current home in 2000, and both homes previously have held a spot on the Inman Park Festival Tour of Homes roster.

An architect by trade, this Florida native and Auburn University alumnus has been a principal of Jones Pierce Architects for the past 15 years. Along the way, however, he has also developed his artistic skills, pursuing interests in photography, watercolor and illustration. In fact, as an avid Festival volunteer, Cooper created the new, more visually interesting Festival map that was introduced last year. And this year he is leading the efforts to create another magical Butterfly Ball for Inman Park neighbors.

This year's Festival design was locally inspired, drawing from the intricate line work of tattoo designs prominent in Little 5 Points, the hand painted Victorian-era signs that front many establishments and the colorful murals that dot the neighborhood. Cooper masterfully brings these elements together with a contemporary flair, resulting in a design that is fresh but familiar – which is quite appropriate for the Inman Park Festival, since that just might be how many neighbors would also describe life in Inman Park. M

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April Public Safety News/ March Crime Report

Hopefully, by the time you are reading this, the new and improved shopping cart for IPNA and IPSP membership will be up and running. One of the features we have added is the ability to set up recurring payments so that you can always be certain that your IPNA and IPSP memberships are up to date. Instead of having to fill out an application every year, you will have access to your account to edit your personal information and to upgrade your Security Patrol level at any time. We are hoping that this will make it easier than ever for Inman Parkers to maintain their commitment to both IPNA and IPSP.

On that note, we have had an influx of new neighbors over the last year. If you are a newcomer, you probably have questions regarding our Security Patrol and how it works. Our website, www.inmanpark.org has information regarding the Patrol and should be able to answer most of your questions, but if not, you can always reach me at public.safety@inmanpark.org. You may already have a Security Patrol yard sign in front of your new home. This indicates that the previous resident made a commitment to safety in Inman Park and it is imperative that you help continue that legacy. If you live in a managed or multi-unit property with a separate HOA within Inman Park, your property may already be a member – look for the distinctive yard sign at the entrance to your property and if there isn't one, reach out to your HOA 's Board and ask them to consider joining.

Now last month's crime:

NOTE: APD's reporting system is running a few weeks behind so I have added recent incidents of note that are not yet on their website.

Auto Theft: on 3/10 a vehicle was reported stolen from Alta Ave. and on 3/16 one was reported stolen from a business parking lot on Moreland Ave.

Burglary: A business on Waddell was burglarized on 3/5 and a substantial amount of hair weaves were stolen. An apartment on North Highland was burglarized during the day on 3/5 as well and on 3/13 a house undergoing renovation on Edgewood had power tools stolen from the detached garage overnight.

Robbery: In the early evening of 3/4 a woman walking her dog behind 240 North Highland was approached by suspects who displayed a handgun and took her cell phone. On 3/9 two visitors to the neighborhood were robbed on their way from Little Five Points back to the MARTA station. The victims said that they had encountered the suspects earlier while shopping.

Theft from Vehicle: A catalytic converter was stolen from a vehicle on Elizabeth on 3/11. Vehicle break-ins were reported on Washita on 3/13 and on Edgewood on 3/8

Theft: It was reported to me that several folks have had packages taken off of their porches after delivery. If you are a victim of such a crime, it is important to call 911 and file a police report.

<u>Please note</u>: If you wish to perform any construction work (beyond routine maintenance) on the exterior of a site, home, or building in the Inman Park Historic District, you must contact the AUDC to begin their review/approval process. Please contact me at the email address above as early in the project as possible to schedule meetings and be placed on the monthly IPNA meeting agenda, or for any questions related to the historic regulations or approval process.

Recent AUDC actions on applications for Certificates of Appropriateness:

February 27

- 135 Krog Street Application for a Review and Comment (RC-13-027) for a variance (V-13-001) to reduce the rear yard setback from 20' to 10' to allow for the installation of additional parking and a special exception (V-13-004) to reduce on-site parking from 40 spaces (required) to an undetermined number (possibly 14). Property is zoned C-2/ Beltline/ Inman Park Historic (Subarea 3).
- 37 Waverly Way Applications for Type III Certificates of Appropriateness (CA3-12-260) for variances to allow an increase in the half depth front yard from 10'(required) to 12' (proposed); an increase in the left side yard setback from 3' (required) to 24' (proposed); an increase in the house width from 34' (required) to 48' (proposed) and an increase in the house height from 15' (required) to 25'9" (proposed); to use another block face as a point of comparison under the compatibility rule; and (CA3-12-259) for construction of a new residential. Wavy Gravy

Single pane and leaky, I could almost see dollar bills being sucked out each winter and summer on the drafts around the six windows original to the 1906 main part of my house. I rebuilt four of the sashes back in the '90s, and my dad replaced the front one when I accidentally pushed Gary Biggars through it when we were ten. (I also got my tush blistered for nearly decapitating Gary!)

While waiting for the AUDC (Atlanta Urban Design Commission) to give me final approval for my Type III CoA (Certificate of Appropriateness), I wanted to do some other needed repairs. One window's sill was totally rotted from the water dripping onto it from the camellia bush my dad planted for my mom back in the '60s. I cut the bush back and saw the damage.

Luckily for me, my massage therapist from Candler Park Chiropractic has a boyfriend named John Salversen of The Handyman Can. She said he has a house in Grant Park and was very knowledgeable about repairs to early 20th century homes, especially those that were built for working folk like ours here in the Hale-Strickland section.

John came by a few weeks ago, and I showed him the window that needed the sill replaced. He effused about how beautiful my windows are. He called the glass in them "wavy gravy." I told John that I, too, loved the handmade panes in the original windows and loved the way the light played in the ripples in the early morning and late afternoon.

The panes were made for windows at the turn of the 20th century and had the rippled look even when new. There are two types: crown glass and cylinder glass. The kind in my house is cylinder glass. To make cylinder glass, a glass worker would blow a large tube of glass. Then, cutting off the ends and splitting the tube, the pieces, or "shawls" were laid in an oven to flatten into a sheet. Some tubes could reach almost 20" in diameter and seven or eight feet in length. As the glass relaxed, ripples would form, causing the wavy appearance.

But, I lamented to John, although I love the history and the beauty of my original windows, the heating and cooling costs were outrageous and I was facing the painful decision of having to replace my windows, even though I do not like the way modern windows look in our historic homes! Not only are the muntins too thin and the sashes too flat, the panes don't have any character -- no "wavy gravy!"

Aghast--that was the look on John's face when I said I was going to replace the windows. He smiled and explained that he has the "hook up" for replacement glass from the period and that his technique to restore the windows would make them as energy efficient, if not more, than modern windows.

He quoted me a price that would be a fourth of what replacement would be and I agreed. The look of pride on his face when he finished the job was priceless. His boast that I could "thump" the glass and it would sound like a drum was right! I am so thankful the universe sent me someone who has the skill and a love for the history of our homes, someone who showed me how I can have efficient, airtight original windows and still admire the way the light plays with the "wavy gravy" panes!



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BETTY IRENE RIDDERHOFF

November 1, 1928 - March 11, 2013

Betty Ridderhoff was a prime example of how a neighborhood benefits by having residents of diverse ages, backgrounds and skills. She was 62 years old when she moved to Inman Park in 1990 and had recently retired from running a successful wholesale sewing machine distributorship for more than 30 years with her husband Bob. She immediately plunged into the work of this neighborhood. Even when Bob died in 2002 and her son David died in 2004, Betty soldiered on, never missing a day of "work" on her many volunteer responsibilities.

Her contributions to Inman Park were many and substantial. From editing, almost single-handedly, the Inman Park Advocator for almost 18 years (May 1993 through March 2010), to producing the neighborhood directory for so many years that no one remembers when she started, to serving as the Treasurer of the Trolley Barn (well, actually the Atlanta & Edgewood Street Railway Company) for 14 years (from 1997-2010), Betty took on LARGE volunteer responsibilities and executed them with a thoroughness and attention to detail that was impressive and unmatched in the history of Inman Park.

But Betty's contributions didn't stop with the jobs she did. She and Bob were incredibly generous with their home, opening it for holiday parties, Festival Tour of Homes, Cocoon Ball, Good Moves dance performances, political campaigns, weddings, birthday parties, and even pony rides, to name only a few of the many events held there. They were also generous with their financial assets, paying to pave the Inman Park Methodist Church parking lot and contributing to every other financial need of the church and the neighborhood. They also donated a house they owned on Hardee Street to Habitat for Humanity.

Betty grew up on the west side of Chicago, the youngest of four children born to Valentine and Viola Mohl, a furniture maker and a seamstress. She graduated from Austin High School, a wellregarded and rigorous part of the Chicago public school system at the time, working part-time for an insurance company while still in school. After graduating, she added a second job at night, working for an attorney who, she always said, taught her almost everything she knew. Her first marriage at the age of 19 ended in divorce four years later but left her with a two-year-old son Allen. To make ends meet, she moved back in with her mother.

That move proved to be a good one when her mother decided to order a sewing machine for Betty. The company sent a salesman to her mother's house, Bob Ridderhoff (divorced with three children and schooled in the sewing machine business), while Betty was at work. Bob, ever the ladies' man, met Betty's sister Yvonne and asked her out. However, when he returned to demonstrate the machine to its new owner, he cancelled that date and asked Betty out instead. In 1953, Bob and Betty were married and exactly nine months later their daughter Valerie was born.

Betty was not a person who felt sorry for herself. She took action. When Bob complained about being unhappy in Chicago because his ex-wife had married his business partner and gotten their sewing machine business in the process, Betty packed the entire contents of the family's apartment into a trailer and had it ready to go when he got home from work. They were moving to Los Angeles! Lest you think that was completely crazy, Bob's mother already lived there, and they moved in with her.

Bob got a job working for the Fire Department and later worked for the City of Los Angeles in the Air Pollution Control District. Because he was a gifted machinist, Bob was able to build the first device used for testing cars for emissions control. An extremely frugal Betty managed to save the \$15,000 necessary to buy their first house, 1167 Hoover Street. This house number figured heavily in their choice of a home in Inman Park, whose address, fortuitously, happened to be 167 Elizabeth Street! And their son David was born in 1958.

Bob and Betty worked very hard all their lives. To make ends meet they rented rooms in their new house and Bob taught dance lessons in the basement. The opportunity to get back into the sewing machine business came in 1959 when they were able to get the Bernina sewing machine distributorship for the state of California. That business was started in the basement of the house. With Bob as the salesman, Betty responsible for all the accounting and managerial aspects of the business and with the help of their children Allen and Valerie, they made a success of the distributorship and started several other sewingrelated businesses, including compiling and publishing a sewing machine "Blue Book" which Betty continued until just a few years ago. The Bernina business ended in the mid-1980's when Bernina changed its distribution system to allow it to sell directly to the public. In 1990, Bob and Betty decided to retire and moved to Atlanta, both for its weather and its proximity to various family members. Oh, and there was also that house in Inman Park that they absolutely loved and had to have. With a basement big enough to hold Bob's machine and wood-working shops as well as everything that remained from their businesses, and a yard big enough for the dogs that they loved, it was exactly right for them. The rest, as they say, is history!

Sandra Heartfield -An Inman Park Original

Sandra Heartfield, August 20, 1942 -February 8, 2013

On February 8, 2013, Sandra lost her 15-year battle with breast cancer and is survived by her husband, Harlon Joye, her three sons and their families.

In many of the symphony cards Sandra's family received, friends emphasized Sandra's generosity, her positive outlook, her sense of community and family,

her great spirit, and her legendary parties that brought together all sorts of people from the neighborhood and surrounding community. Based on these remarks, her family thought it would be good to share some of Sandra's involvement in Inman Park's history and offer some insight on her contributions that helped build this place called Inman Park we all enjoy today.

As a 20-something full-time working mom with three kids, Sandra became an "Elizabeth Street Pioneer" when she began renovating a house on Elizabeth Street. This was in 1971, a time when Inman Park was as full of risk as it was promise for the future. Sandra loved Inman Park--her oft-repeated advice on building a strong community was: "People need to be interested, be involved, and always be willing to help!" Judging by her community involvement, she took her own advice to heart.

She was a member of the original Inman Park Restoration organization in the early 1970's (today's I.P.N.A). She helped organize the 1st Inman Park Tour of Homes and included her home in this inaugural event. She was an Inman Park representative to B.O.N.D. (Bass Organization for Neighborhood Development), a citizenaction committee dedicated to rehabilitating Little Five Points. She served as a Board Member for the Little Five Points Community Center for over ten years and was a central figure in developing The Broken Wall, a youth center providing neighborhood teenagers a gathering place when Little Five was a very unsafe area in the 70's. She also served as a member of the Neighborhood Planning Unit N (NPU-N) for Inman Park for five years.

Sandra was and always will be considered the "Queen" of WRFG (Radio Free Georgia) fundraising. She developed the idea for their Annual Silent Auction, and for over 17 years, she worked tirelessly at it, generating over \$150,000 in contributions to the station. In 2011, WRFG awarded Sandra their Community Builder award. This grande dame of Inman Park and the Little Five Points community was the epitome of strength, grace and beauty.

Notes from the March 28, 2013 meeting:

Public Reports:

- **Fire Department** reminded homeowners to change smoke detector batteries regularly and encouraged the use of carbon monoxide detectors. If you don't have a smoke detector, the Fire Department will provide one at no cost.

- **Parks Department: Tom Cullen** reported that the Candler Park Pool will open on Memorial Day this year.

License Review Board:

- Jason Hill, Restaurant (Folk Art), 465 N. Highland Ave NE: NPU Board voted unanimously to support the new business request.

- **Robert Bruce Logue III**, Restaurant (BoccaLupo), 753 Edgewood Ave NE: NPU Board voted unanimously to support the change of ownership request.

Zoning Review Board:

- 470 Candler Park Drive (1st Existentialist Church)

application U-13-002: NPU Board voted unanimously to support application for a Special Use Permit to operate an after care program for children.

Board of Zoning Adjustment:

- **135 Krog St**, applications V-13-001 and V-13-004: NPU Board voted to support applications for a variance to reduce the transitional rear yard setback from 20 ft (required) to 10 ft to allow for the installation of additional parking for an existing millinery building, and a special exception to reduce the number of on-site parking spaces from 40 (required) to 30 (17 paved, 13 "grass-paved"). - **470 Sterling St**, application V-13-025: NPU Board voted to support application for a variance from Zoning Regulations to reduce the north side yard setback from 7 ft. (required) to 3 ft. for a bathroom addition.

- **2060 Howard Circle**, application V-13-031: Based on ongoing negotiations between applicant and neighbor opposed, NPU Board voted to defer application for a variance from Zoning Regulations to reduce the west side yard setback from 7 ft. (required) to 4 ft. and reduce the east side yard setback from 7 ft. (required) to 6.9 ft. for construction of a new single-family dwelling.
