

Rick Bizot made a motion to add Dunkin Donuts to the agenda, second and carried, which involves a discussion and vote on supporting Candler Park's position.

The IPNA board will not take a position because the property is located in Candler Park. Usually IPNA's NPU rep will support the Candler Park position. L5P Business Association and Candler Park voted against the parking variance.

A motion was made to support Candler Parks decision without discussion, but failed for lack of a second.

Dunkin Donuts is asking for a parking variance to reduce the number of required parking spaces from 43 to 30. This causes many concerns for residents and businesses in the area. Some concerns are being addressed like pedestrian friendliness, traffic due to a drive thru, parking request creates a precedent for more drive thruugh in the area and the buffer at the rear of the property.

A discussion followed

A motion was made for a vote to instruct IPNA's NPU rep to support Candler Park's position to vote against the parking variance; seconded and passed.







Public Reports:

- Planning Department: Nina Gentry reported on a new smartphone app (Cycle Atlanta) that offers a way for cyclists to record bicycle trips and provide planners the data they need to make Atlanta a better place to ride; for information go to www. cycleatlanta.org.
- Atlanta Planning Advisory Board (APAB): Amy Stout reported that the City is introducing an Electronic Legislative Management System (ELMS) that should go online around April

Board of Zoning Adjustment:


Moira views social work as both and art and a science, and strives to push herself to the next level as a patient advocate.


