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

Announcements:

Hank Sforzini representing FitWit, a group fitness club, announced open classes at Boys and Girls Club in Grant Park and in Oakhurst. All are welcome to join. Carolyn McLaughlin encouraged everyone to come out for Phoenix Flies, hosted by Atlanta Preservation Center celebrating Atlanta's Historic Sites. Pat Westrick announced that Friday, March 28 at 7:30 p.m. the Porch Party will be hosted by Karen and Ken Taber, 1094 Alta Avenue. Festival House Tour tickets are available: neighbor's ticket price is \$12, guests are \$15, day of Festival, \$20. Michelle Reinhart announced she has moved from N. Highland Avenue to Edgewood Avenue and is in need of plumbers, electricians and a host of other workmen. Justin Lucia and Zachary LaVigne from Any Spine Chiropractic Center are hosting an Easter egg hunt at 346 Copenhill Avenue, all are invited to join them. Concerned neighbors reported serious problems for a decade now behind Bass High field off Euclid Avenue. Disputed ownership and responsibility, between APS and the Atlanta Water Board, has resulted in an area that is a vagrant crime scene ridden with open sexual acts and drug abuse. Criminal cases reportedly have been dropped because of departments disputing over district boundaries. Neighbors of the community announced they are banding together to overcome the bureaucratic quagmire that has endangered victims. Lieutenant Desmond Floyd, in attendance, agreed to meet with victims after his remarks.

Motion was made, seconded and carried to approve last month's minutes.

Police Officers' Reports

Detective Ari Bleifeld attended in Lt. Schierbaum's absence and shared the following: 1. A perpetrator caught redhanded with a bicycle and bolt cutters was apprehended and matched the identity of the thief caught on a home surveillance video posted on the neighborhood Yahoo board. 2. A reminder to log all serial numbers of bicycles and other possessions to track your property. 3. Problems on the periphery of the Inman Park include tagging of the skate park, a break-in at a Candler Park flower shop, and a cell phone robbery at the Krog Street tunnel. Lieutenant Desmond Floyd addressed assault and burglary concerns along Austin Avenue and pledged to meet with neighbors to investigate and follow up on concerns. Lt. Floyd reported that he and ADA

Keith Lamar had just returned from a walkthrough of problem areas in Poncey Highland. He suggested he meet with neighbors reporting the encampments of the vagrants on schoolyard property, recessed land and parks to do a similar walk-through. L5P continues to experience strong-arm assaults targeting smart phones. Lt. Floyd encouraged people to be attentive to perpetrators shoes, adding, "they may change their shirt and pants, but they rarely change their shoes."

Keith Lamar, Jr., Asst District Attorney and Prosecutor for Zone 6 will go to trial this week prosecuting defendant Richard Carter for his 104th arrest. Photos of those banned from the Inman Park neighborhood for life will be provided to Tony Neu, vp of public safety, for distribution. Mr. Lamar will be holding meetings about neighborhood watch programs in the near future.

Nan Orrock, State Senator District 36, provided an update on the current legislative session and recommended Jay Bookman's recent AJC article as an excellent commentary on the state of politics in Georgia.

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2014 Legislative Session Update

I am honored to serve Inman Park and all of District 36. a vast sweep of Atlanta, including residents in NE, SE, and SW Atlanta, College Park, East Point, and Hapeville since my 2006 election to the Georgia Senate. As your voice in the Senate, I urge you to contact me with your input at nan.orrock@senate.ga.gov or (404) 463-8054.

While progress was made on addressing health concerns with diabetes, lupus, Alzheimer's, and dementia-related diseases, the 2014 legislative session saw a continued assault on education, access to health insurance, voting rights, and civil liberties.

Since 2002, education spending (pre-K-12) has been cut by \$8 billion in Georgia. Nearly 80 percent of our school districts have exceeded class-size caps, and 80 percent will have furloughed teachers this year. I stand with Jason Carter to prioritize education spending, separating it from the state budget, and only fund the rest of the government once we've adequately secured a budget for our schools. I helped defeat Senate Bill 167, which would have dismantled the standards for which our educators and students have spent years preparing.

Healthcare legislation proved to be equally troubling. Senate Bill 98, which passed both the House and the Senate, bars state employee health insurance from covering abortions, making no exception for rape, incest, or fetal anomaly. An egregious attack on women, it parallels further moves to create barriers for healthcare. Families were broken-hearted and weeping in the Capitol halls to see the death of a bill to increase insurance coverage for autistic children and a medical marijuana bill to provide relief to children suffering from repetitive brain seizures.

House Bill 990 creates higher barriers to the expansion of Medicaid to cover nearly 700,000 uninsured Georgians. According to the Georgia Budget and Policy Institute, the move, funded by federal dollars, would actually bring in \$6.5B annually to our state economy and fund the creation of 70,000 jobs over 10 years that cannot be outsourced. Instead, the majority voted to deny our neediest neighbors access to healthcare, which studies show could result in 600-1100 people dying annually from lack of care.

Legislation directly affecting Inman Park died on the Senate floor. House Bill 960 would have expanded the state law governing urban redevelopment to allow the private sector to help finance and build transit projects, therefore streamlining projects for the Atlanta Beltline. I supported an important bill to streamline community improvement districts in Fulton County to enhance infrastructure and broaden our tax base.

Other problematic bills had mixed results:

- Reduction of restrictions on guns in houses of worship, bars and airports (PASSED)
- Allow for refusal of services based on religious objections, essentially denying healthcare services to women and allowing discrimination against the LGBQT community, (DEFEATED)
- Reduction of early voting in municipal elections, from three weeks to six days (DEFEATED)

Thanks for caring and weighing in on urgent public policy issues. The Primary Election has been moved to Tuesday, May 20. Your vote is your voice, and I urge you to speak loudly. M

APD Path Force Unit on the Atlanta **BeltLine**

Many people will travel to this year's Inman Park Festival via the Eastside Trail of the Atlanta BeltLine, so this month we're taking a closer look at safety on the BeltLine and the APD Path Force, the unit that patrols the BeltLine. We recently spoke with Lt. Jeff **Baxter**, the unit's commanding officer, to learn a little more about the BeltLine Path

- The unit includes 15 officers, two supervisors and one lieutenant. They patrol the Atlanta BeltLine and the parks that adjoin it seven days a week from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m., mirroring the park hours.
- The officers primarily conduct patrols on foot and by bicycle, though they are exploring other vehicle options such as electric vehicles and ATVs. The Path Force precinct is located in the Lofts at Reynoldstown Crossing.
- Initially funded by a \$1.8 million U.S. Department of Justice COPS grant in 2012, the unit is comprised entirely of officers who also are military veterans (a requirement of the grant).
- With help from the Path Force, crime on the BeltLine was down 44% from 2012 to
- Cameras installed along all trailheads along the Eastside Trail support the Path Force's efforts, and are monitored by officers in the APD's Video Integration Center on Peachtree Street.
- New lighting was recently installed under bridges along the BeltLine and new signage also is being added.
- To help keep safety on the BeltLine top of mind, Lt. Baxter hosts a quarterly safety meeting that includes representatives from public safety, the Parks department, Public Works, Grady EMS, Atlanta Fire & Rescue and other organizations along the Path Force zones.

The overwhelming popularity of the Atlanta BeltLine has surprised Lt. Baxter most in the past year. And with private-public partnerships, the BeltLine is responding, from teaming up with REI on events along the BeltLine to launching an etiquette campaign with the Atlanta Bicycle Coalition to support a neighborly, fun and enjoyable experience for everyone – even (and especially) when it is at full capacity on a sunny Saturday afternoon.

The Atlanta BeltLine is a welcome addition to the Intown neighborhoods, and we can help keep it a safe place to enjoy. If you frequent the BeltLine, you may want to add these numbers to your phone: their **Fix It Line** (404-477-3687) to report maintenance issues in trails and adjacent parks, and the APD Path Force Unit Precinct (404-546-7284), though you should always call 911 first in an emergency. Finally, www.beltline.org includes a wealth of information about activities along the BeltLine, future development initiatives and how to get involved with growing and preserving this new Atlanta treasure.

80 Spruce Street, 1973 - 2014

I remember the first time I saw our house at 80 Spruce Street. It was March 1973. Mary Singleton, the Inman Park real estate agent at the time, had shown Pat and me, and our children, (Dan, 4 years-old, Michele 2, and Maureen 1), several houses in the neighborhood that were in pretty bad shape. Then she brought us to 80 Spruce. This house was a DISASTER!

The front yard had two very large oak trees, but not one blade of grass. Among the mud puddles were numerous car parts and several wooden planks making up a walkway to a set of very rickety stairs and a rotten front porch, neither of which had a handrail.

The house had been divided into three apartments on the first level and two on the second level. Therefore, we had to go through three doors off the front porch to see the inside of the first level and yet another door to get to the upstairs. The main front door had a plywood window. Upstairs the doors still had hasps and locks. The kids though it was great fun that if you wanted to go to another room you had to go outside and around the porch.

The house had been empty for some time and the inside was as bad as the outside. Our potential new home featured five kitchens and five bathrooms all of which should have been declared toxic waste sites. Many of the windows were broken and several had bullet holes in them. There were space heaters in every room with gas lines running on top of the floor. The only things still intact were the five fireplace mantels. Despite all this, Pat said, "This place feels like it could be a great warm home." I said, "Are you kidding?"

But she was not and despite all the warnings from our friends and family we bought the place in April 1973. Mary just raved about the marvelous potential this house had and how great the neighborhood was going to be. At the closing, Mary gave us two tickets to the 1973 Inman Park Butterfly Ball. There, we met some of the original pioneers of Inman Park and that night Pat and I knew we had not made a mistake; this was truly a very special neighborhood.

By the end of that evening we were signed up to volunteer at the next spring festival. Pat and I spent years as chairs of the parade and entertainment committees, serving on the cleanup committee and doing whatever else we could for the event. We even opened our home for tours three times. We failed to explain to the kids that the tour did not start until the afternoon so they started letting guests in while Wayne was in the shower!

Our involvement soon spread to other neighborhood issues. The kids are grown and gone and the house is starting to get ahead of us. For health reasons we have decided to put 80 Spruce Street on the market. Somewhere along the way we started inviting those who had their houses on tour to come to our house for brunch the Sunday of festival. The tradition grew to include committee members and then just any neighbors who wanted to visit before the last day of Festival.

Before we sell, we want to celebrate our 40+ years in Inman Park. We want to invite all our neighbors, past and present, to the last Smith-family hosted brunch, on Sunday, April 27 from 9 a.m. until noon, at 80 Spruce St. Bring your memories, maybe some photos and your good cheer. Pat and I can't wait to see vou. M

• The City now has a smartphone app (Atlanta Go) available for iphone and android, which allows Atlanta residents to view and pay water bills, view water consumption and receive notifications.

License Review Board:

• Howard Hsu (Sweet Auburn Barbecue, 656 N. Highland Ave, Poncey Highland) New alcohol license request for old location (former Pura Vida location). NPU Board voted unanimously to support.

Zoning Review Board:

- NC-1 clarify/strengthen (Z-13-039; 14-O-1019, formerly 13-O-1259), an Ordinance to amend Chapter 32A (NC-1 Little Five Points Neighborhood Commercial District) for the purposes of including certain language at the request of the Little Five Points Business Association to reiterate, clarify and strengthen the regulations for the district, and for other purposes. NPU Board voted unanimously to defer.
- 1085 Ponce de Leon Ave NE (Druid Hills Baptist Church) (U-14-004), seeking a Special Use Permit to operate an existing church after the property is re-zoned to MRC-2. NPU Board voted unanimously to
- **678 Moreland Ave NE (U-14-005)**, seeking a Special Use Permit to operate a Montessori School on property zoned R-G. NPU Board voted unanimously to support.
- **Five (5) Proposed Zoning Ordinance** Revisions have been introduced, with an estimated public hearing date of May 1 or 8, 2014. All five were deferred unanimously by the NPU Board so that NPU reps can take them back to their groups for discussion and feedback. Full versions of the proposed ordinances will be posted on the IPNA website. In brief, the proposed ordinances are:
- Window sign ordinance (Z-13-046): TO AMEND THE SIGN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, CHAPTER 28A OF THE ATLANTA ZONING ORDINANCE, AS AMENDED TO DEFINE THE TERM "WINDOW SIGN", TO REQUIRE WINDOW SIGNS TO OBTAIN SIGN PERMITS IF VISIBLE FROM THE PUBIC RIGHTS OF WAY, TO REGULATE THE TIME, PLACE AND MANNER IN WHICH WINDOW

- SIGNS SHALL BE PERMITTED; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.
- Urban Agriculture (Z-14-005): TO AMEND VARIOUS SECTIONS OF THE ATLANTA ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFINING URBAN GARDENS AND MARKET GARDENS AS A PERMITTED USE; TO PROVIDE WHERE AND UNDER WHAT CONDITIONS SUCH USES SHALL BE PERMITTED; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.
- **Works of Art on Private Property** (Z-14-007): TO AMEND THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA BY CREATING A NEW ARTICLE IN CHAPTER 46 "CIVIC AND CULTURAL AFFAIRS" WHICH IS TO BE KNOWN AS "WORKS OF ART ON PRIVATE PROPERTY," AMENDING SECTION 16-28.025 OF THE 1982 ZONING ORDINANCE TO RESERVE SAID SECTION FOR FUTURE USE; AND OTHER PURPOSES.
- **Clarify Accessory Structures on Public School property** (Z-14-013): TO AMEND CHAPTER 29 OF THE ZONING CODE OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, ENTITLED "DEFINITION AT SECTION 16-29.00 (2) SO AS TO CLARIFY THE MANNER IN WHICH THE DEFINITION OF ACCESSORY STRUCTURES AND USES SHOULD BE APPLIED TO PUBLIC SCHOOLS: AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.
- Ponce City Market Signage District (Z-14-014): TO AMEND PART 16. CHAPTER 28A OF THE 1982 ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, AS AMENDED, SO AS TO CREATE A NEW SECTION 16-28A 010(51) TO PROVIDE FOR COMPREHENSIVE SIGNAGE REGULATIONS FOR THE HISTORIC SEARS ROEBUCK & CO. SIGN DISTRICT; TO AMEND THE OFFCIAL ZONING MAP TO ADD THE HISTORIC SEARS ROEBUCK & CO. SIGN DISTRICT; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Board of Zoning Adjustment:

- 374 Clifton Rd NE (V-13-193), seeking a variance from Zoning Regulations to reduce the transitional south side yard setback from 20 ft. (required) to 2.5 ft., to exceed the maximum transitional height plane, to reduce the minimum vard requirements from 5000 ft2 to 2907 ft2. NPU Board voted unanimously to defer.
- 2038 McLendon Ave NE (V-13-028), seeking a variance from Zoning Regulations to reduce the front side yard

- setback from 35 ft. (required) to 21 ft. and to reduce the west side yard setback from 7 ft.(required) to 3 ft. for a secondstory addition to an existing single-family residence. NPU Board voted unanimously to support.
- 1835 Indiana Ave NE (V-14-032), seeking a variance from Zoning Regulations to reduce the front side yard setback from 30 ft. (required) to 10 ft. for a new singlefamily residence. NPU Board voted unanimously to support.

- 14-O-1025, an ordinance to amend Chapter 2 ("Administration"), Article XVI ("Boards, Councils, Commissions and Authorities"), Division 2 ("Clean City Commission") of the City of Atlanta code of ordinances so as to rename Division 2 from the Clean City Commission to the Keep Atlanta Beautiful Commission, to move the position of Executive Director for Keep Atlanta Beautiful under the purview of the Department of Public Works, to direct Keep Atlanta Beautiful to provide City Council on a bi-annual basis a performance audit of all activities, and for other purposes. The NPU Board voted unanimously to take no position.
- 14-O-1138, an ordinance authorizing the installation of public art at the Boulevard Underpass (where Boulevard crosses under Dekalb Avenue between Edgewood Avenue and Memorial Drive), Atlanta, Georgia as pursuant to code section 16-28.025 of the 1982 zoning ordinance of the Cty of Atlanta, and for other purposes. The NPU Board voted unanimously to support.



What on earth are "Joel Awards"? Last month's Advocator had an article by the tireless Amy Higgins asking for nominations for this year's awards, and explaining that they are named after Joel Hurt, the developer of Inman Park, they are intended to honor the neighborhood's most dedicated volunteers, and are awarded at Butterfly Ball each year. All of that is factual, and a great overview.

But, as we all know, nothing is ever simple in Inman Park (one of its more endearing qualities,) so there's always more to the story.

First of all, we've been doing this for forty years. According to the information I've been able to dig up, the first recipients were Robert Griggs and Holly Mull, in 1974. Griggs was the founding father of Inman Park Restoration (IPR), now re-named the Inman Park Neighborhood Association (IPNA); Holly worked for the mayor's office and was instrumental in getting some pretty significant attention to the neighborhood's concerns in those early days. (At least I think that's why they were honored; a call for copies of all the old Joels a few years ago did not produce either one of these earliest awards.)

Secondly, there is no "standing" Joel Award Committee. Each year, the

committee is composed of the previous two years' recipients, so the criteria for the awards tend to be something of a moving target. Consequently, the recipients seem to reflect the priorities and issues facing the neighborhood at that particular point in time. Sometimes the award is for effort way beyond the ordinary, sometimes for just being a good neighbor, sometimes for consistency in volunteering, sometimes for an organization that has benefited the neighborhood, sometimes for leadership, sometimes for...well there is the occasional Joel that no one can seem to figure out.

Finally, like the Oscars, Tonys or Emmys, Joel Awards are given at a snazzy party - in our case, at Butterfly Ball, where we have historically celebrated the beginning of another Festival – and proven to each other that we do, in fact, clean up pretty well. Traditionally, they are announced at the band's first break, with either the committee chair or the Festival chairs reading the award, with its citation of all the good works the recipient has accomplished. Also traditionally, it's a challenge to be heard over the happy conversations going on all around.

But this year you know what it means. Stop for a minute. Listen. See if you recognize the individuals by their names or their works, and make a promise to yourselves and your beloved 'hood to join their ranks in the next couple of years. Raise your hand, volunteer, join in, make a difference, donate time or talent or effort. No one cares how long you have lived here (or even if you do – there's no residency requirement,) whether you rent or own, whether you live in a house or a condo or a loft or an apartment. We need every pair of hands, every brain and every ounce of volunteer effort to keep Inman Park a great place to live, work and thrive. So jump in and help. There could be a Joel Award in it for you if you do! M



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School Registration Time

It's that time of year! Time for school registration. Inman Park is fortunate to have excellent public schools for parents to consider when deciding where to enroll their children for next school year, and each has active and engaged parent bodies. Our schools are part of the Grady Cluster within Atlanta Public Schools. The cluster organization allows for vertical alignment of curriculum and instruction from elementary to middle to high school. The schools follow the Georgia Common Core Performance Standards.

Mary Lin Elementary is a top performing school within APS. Located in Candler Park, it serves approximately 600 students in grades K-5 from the neighborhoods of Inman Park, Candler Park and Lake Claire. In addition to core subjects, students have classes in Spanish, music, art and physical education. The school also has a gifted ("Challenge") program, and programs for band, chorus and orchestra for 4th and 5th grades. Each classroom has an interactive whiteboard, and the Foundation has provided a Mac lab in the media center. An extremely active school, there are many events and activities held throughout the year. Mary Lin is currently undergoing an expansion and renovation.

Inman Middle School, located in Virginia Highland, serves over 900 students in grades 6-8 and focuses on academic excellence and personal character development. It is here that students from Mary Lin join students from the elementary schools of Hope-Hill, Morningside and Springdale Park. The Georgia Department of Education named Inman Middle School as a 2013 Reward School in the category of Highest Performing Schools. At Inman, academic offerings expand to include German, French, Theater Arts, Health and more. Students have a wide variety of extracurricular clubs and sports from which to choose. Inman will also be receiving an expansion, with a tentative construction start date of December 2015.

Students from Inman Middle School move on to Grady High School, where they are joined by in-zone students from Centennial Place and Intown Academy, Located in Midtown and named for Henry W. Grady, editor of The Atlanta Constitution, Grady High School has a long tradition of producing leaders for our city, state and nation. The approximately 1,275 students at Grady can find their niche in the multitude of activities, teams, sports and clubs including robotics, debate, or even trying their hand at journalism for the award winning school magazine, The Southerner. Grady regularly sends graduates to top colleges and universities and many students receive awards, distinctions and scholarships. Last year's senior class included six National Merit Scholars.

What's Special

La Calavera is all about good nutrition that tastes good! They use only organic flour in everything they make. Eric and Dale are very serious about this. Their Sprouted Wheat Bread involves buying organic wheat berries, soaking and sprouting them, and from the sprouts, they ground the flour that makes the bread.

Their SuperSourdough Bread is a real treat that involves resting the dough for six days before baking. This gives it an extra tangy flavor and it's easier to digest for some gluten-sensitive individuals. Because it takes so long to make, though, it's available only on weekends.

Many of their baked goods are from traditional Mexican recipes, including Pan Dulce Orejas (caramelized elephant ears – yum!) and Marranitos, or "little piggies," which are amazing gluten-free molasses cookies.

And during the month of October and part of November, Eric makes Pan De Muerto, a special sweet bread made only during the Day of the Dead holiday. They also can, on occasion, make custom La Calaveras, which are the wonderful decorated sugar skulls. You may want to remember this come Halloween, as they are gorgeous (but get your request in early!).
