



Festival Focus

Tour of Homes - '70 Style

The do-it-yourself urban pioneers of Inman Park had little choice but to be on the Tour of Homes. In the early days, regardless of the state of their renovation, "everyone was on tour in 1974," said Inman Park neighbor Eileen Brown, who chaired the festival committee at the time. "Nobody got a pass," she said.

In the early 70s, Inman Park was a gateway neighborhood for people from outside of Atlanta who wanted to make it in the city. Splattered among the boarding houses and apartments were a few determined homeowners willing to restore Inman Park to its old glory one home at a time. Brown says the owner occupancy rate in Inman Park was just around 14 percent in the early '70s.

To attract more people, the Tour of Homes and Festival were started to "show off" the place.


"We wanted more owner occupancy and more publicity for the neighborhood," said Brown.

That meant homeowners opened their doors for the tour every year, regardless of whether their renovations were finished. Many times visitors would stop by and check in on the annual progress. Brown remembers. "They'd come and say, 'oh, you finished your dining room since last year," she said. The 1974 home tour book lists 28 properties for people to visit. It cost just \$2 dollars to see them. Brown said one of the biggest accomplishment of the 1974 Tour was the new design of the brochure that endures today. For the first few years "We had this crazy fold out paper that listed all the homes," she said. She credits festival committee member Don Jordan with the change in style to a booklet that fits well into your hands, your back pockets or a number 12 envelope to be mailed out. Back then they only could afford to print the brochure in three colors so, instead of photos, the booklet is speckled with wonderful and whimsical drawings.

In 1974 Brown remembers 7,000 people attending the Tour of Homes. Today, that number is a bit higher and so is the admission price.

To become part of the Tour of Homes legacy in Inman Park, consider opening up your house next year or volunteer as a house sitter to greet visitors to our neighborhood.

Many before us inspired such activism, and helped transform the 'hood from "transitional" to -like it or not- "trendy," yet still communal. Thank you all— our hosts, the band, the many who came to the Trolley Barn and/or sent good wishes. Wow! How grateful we are for a terrific community!

Inman Park's small-town feel results from the fact that folks thought to join forces, whether cooperating on clean-ups; establishing a credit union, the IPNA, and many committees to process neighborhood issues, host parties, publish The Advocator (key for unity), and run Festival; founding the Cooperative Preschool; preserving our neighborhood's integrity by stopping the Expressway and creating Freedom Park; starting Tree Watch; creating Friends of Inman Park for donations; sponsoring nearby Habitat for Humanity remodeling projects; initiating our Recycle pick-up before the City did; creating groups for gourmet (or not) dinners, potlucks, book discussions, and email; all these things foster community.


