It is the time for season two of "House of Cards: Inman Park." I certainly hope that FLOTIPNA doesn't go all Claire Underwood on me. At this point, dear reader, it is time for a recap of season one and a preview of season two.

I must confess, I did not think the show would make it. When I stepped in, we had a nice surplus and the major developments at Krog Street Market and Inman Quarter were complete. Where would the drama come from? I needn't have worried. Season 1 was certainly action-packed. We began with the issue over the BeltLine and which path the trail should follow through the parcel between Edgewood and Dekalb. After a few months of suspense, the story had a happy ending when all the stakeholders came to agreement over a path that would preserve the possibility of developing transit along the BeltLine's pedestrian trail. Some of the neighborhood's wise heads counseled me that every presidential term includes one contentious issue, so I had gotten mine out of the way early. Wrong again. Ratings went through the roof in February with the Preschool matter. These were the big headline grabbers, but so much more got done. We had fun porch parties, a terrific holiday party and Fourth of July party, we had book club and Inman Diners' Club dinners. Work continued at Springvale Park, we considered (and mostly approved) a range of relatively routine zoning and historic preservation applications. Sidewalks were repaired. The Lifelong committee continued its remarkable efforts. We committed our surplus to grants that will strengthen the neighborhood many ways (grants to local schools, lighting in Freedom Park, more sidewalks repaired and replaced). Our transportation committee continued to work with the City on projects identified in the KLENH study to be funded by the Renew Atlanta bond (the improvements at the intersection of Lake/Austin and Elizabeth, improvements for crossing North Highland, coming improvements for the intersection of Euclid and Edgewood and around Delta Park). And,



of course, another magnificent Festival. Dear Leader would love to take credit for this and all the other neighborhood accomplishments (wine stroll, bocce tournaments, crossing flags on North Highland). In fact, however, I had virtually nothing to do with any of this (except the bocce tournament: all I do is win, win, win). So many neighbors have contributed so many hours and such good will to prove Robert frost wrong: good neighbors make good neighbors.

You may wonder, what's in store for season two. Season one taught me that it's impossible to know in advance where the drama will come from. That said, Little Five Points bears watching. Plans are advancing for a redesign of Findley Plaza, and it is crucial for the neighborhood to be involved to make sure it is done right. The Commercial Improvement District is managing this redesign as well as traffic measures and development recommendations up and down Moreland Avenue, including Bass Field. Another potential nominee for lead actor in a neighborhood drama is Freedom Park, which is embarking on a major strategic planning effort this year.

Less dramatic, but also important are a number of additional ongoing efforts. The ad hoc Film Committee will be considering best practices around filming in the neighborhood. The by-laws committee will be considering improvements to the way we conduct business at IPNA. Finally, IPNA will be reaching out to engage neighbors, new and not-so-new, who are looking for opportunities to be involved.

Tune in. It's going to be a(nother) binge-worthy year.



Neighborhood Meeting Highlights: What you missed...

IPNA, June 21, 2017 meeting at The Trolley Barn:

- Neil introduced Thom Abelew as the VP of Public Safety, Cristy Lenz as the VP of Communication. David Bicoff as the VP for Historic Preservation, and Chris Coffee as the new Secretary.
- Caleb Racicot discussed the Lifelong Inman Park study. The study was funded by IPNA and the City of Atlanta. Inman Park has unique challenges for older residents such as our sidewalks and beautiful old homes and rising housing costs and property taxes. Residents want to stay in IP after retiring.
- Fulton County Commission Chairman John Eaves announced that property taxes are frozen for 2017 back to the 2016 level. The board has changed the appeal date as well and we will be getting a letter with the process. He also mentioned several ideas to stabilize property taxes, such as identifying transitional neighborhoods and protect them from large increases and providing seniors with more protection from large increases.
- Sandy Hoke spoke before the close about why the section of the BeltLine between Irwin and Dekalb is not open yet. He stated that soil still needs to be tested and nearby construction is holding up the opening. They are predicting it will open in August.



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IPV Townhome Residents: Keeping Up Their End of the Bargain

The residents of Inman Park Village Townhomes (IPVTH) all share different reasons for moving to Inman Park and choosing a townhome lifestyle. But one thing that unites them is a passion for preserving the integrity of the community they joined -ahistoric neighborhood traditionally known for single family homes and lush landscaping.


Located on the BeltLine across from Ladybird, Inman Park Village (IPV) – referred to as "the Curve" – is often the first thing people see when walking through Inman Park. Features such as the crescent-shaped buildings, a courtyard fountain, pergolas and green space make the neighborhood unique.

When the last townhome was sold in 2013, several residents got together and formed a landscape committee. Committee leader John Semon said, "I've always believed that a well-maintained landscape adds to one's quality of life. So when the opportunity presented itself to get involved, I thought it would be a great way to contribute."

The first project of the committee was to recommend a new landscaper, which immediately addressed irrigation, lighting and other issues. Once the basics were in place, they saw an opportunity to build on the neighborhood's foundational assets to create a more garden-like feel that that would be unique to the community.

Fellow resident and committee member Mark Fleming lent his talent in drafting an extensive landscape improvement plan at no cost to IPV - a huge savings to homeowners. Mark was trained in Landscape Design and Horticulture in England where he grew up. He also is owner of McGill & Fleming Landscapes, a highend residential landscape design firm.

"When I first started to look to purchase a home here, I was impressed with the architecture, but disappointed in the landscaping," said Mark. "The plantings lacked interest and most were low-budget builder plants (as we say in the trade). Plus the maintenance of everything at that time was poor. When

John invited me to get involved in the committee I was delighted to help and put forward a vision for the landscape community."

Mark's plan focused on the most visible assets of the community – the center courtyard and pool area – where residents often socialize and entertain. To keep costs manageable, many of the existing plants would be relocated while higher-end plantings were proposed in places where they would have the most impact. "The architecture here is quite beautiful. The right plant material can help exploit that," said Mark.

Once the plan was in place, the committee presented recommendations to the homeowners. Because the new HOA was still building reserve funds, it would require a special homeowner assessment.

John said, "There were several contributing factors to getting homeowner support: Presenting costs on a per unit basis, having Mark's team implement the vision and finally, having a great community of owners who understand the value of a beautiful landscape and the enjoyment that comes from it."

Today, townhome residents and their guests can sit on benches under vine-covered arbors, enjoying the fragrance of jasmine and the lush beauty of a thoughtfully-designed garden landscape.

What is the Rose Library? The Rose

Library is Emory University's special collections repository. Our mission is to acquire, preserve, arrange, describe, and provide public access to materials of lasting historical value. As I mentioned earlier, we have a particular interest and strength in collections that document neighborhood activism and the road fight, including the records of the Druid Hills Civic Association and the papers of Jack Boozer, Phyllis Schwartz, Virginia S. Taylor, and Dana Francis White.

The Rose Library tries to make the transfer of materials to Emory as simple as possible. We will pick up your boxes or, if you live outside the Atlanta area, we can send you pre-paid FedEx shipping labels for the materials and can help coordinate the shipping to Emory.

Help Us Find Road Fight Materials

Dear Neighbors,

In August 2016 we celebrated the 25th anniversary of the signing of the settlement agreement that brought closure to the Presidential Parkway battle, better known as the Road Fight. During the celebration, an announcement was made by representatives of C.A.U.T.I.O.N. that there would be a process for donating their materials from the road fight to an archive for preserving materials for research and historical records.

After meeting with representatives of Georgia State Special Collections and Archives, the Atlanta History Center, and Emory University, we have arranged with archivist Randy Gue from the Stewart A. Rose Manuscript, Archives, and Rare Book Library at Emory University to add our materials to their C.A.U.T.I.O.N. collection. Emory has the resources and professional staff to review and catalog our papers. Having our documents, letters, papers, photographs, and memorabilia located in one central place will make it convenient for researchers, students, and the public to access the collection.

We need your help notifying the community, neighbors, and friends who have moved, about the importance of preserving these materials. An announcement on Facebook, on your website, or in your newsletter would be extremely helpful. We are available to make a brief presentation at a neighborhood meeting, if that would be of interest. The process is easy and Emory will pick up your boxes. If the person contributing materials lives outside the Atlanta area they will send you pre-paid FedEx shipping labels.

There were many other groups and organizations that were invaluable to this grassroots movement. They include the Olmsted Parks Society, the Roadbusters, Bond Community Star, Great Park Planning, the Atlanta Preservation Center, National Trust for Historic Preservation, Sierra Club, the City of Atlanta, Decatur, and various governmental entities. We encourage these organizations to consider adding their valuable documents to the collection.

The Lifelong Inman Park Plan was presented to neighbors at the June IPNA meeting. This plan describes goals and policies for housing, mobility/accessibility, services/information, and social engagement that support Inman Park's transformation



into a Lifelong Community by incorporating the needs of older residents into all aspects of community planning, development, and living. The Lifelong Committee provides support to the IPNA board and committees in its quest to make Inman Park a Lifelong Community.


- Monitor their areas to identify new neighbors.


This project features three new PodPlays: "Building Little 5" by Annie Harrison Elliott, "Sit Anywhere" by Amina S McIntyre, and "Ravenwood" by Pamela Turner. These three stories reveal fascinating facts and little known Atlanta history during the 1970's and 1980's revitalization of Little Five Points. You will journey through the restoration of the theatres that are now 7 Stages and Variety Playhouse, listen in on a conversation about race on MARTA, and learn how the first Wiccan house of worship became federally recognized as a nonprofit religious institution. The experience will inspire listeners to more carefully explore their neighborhood and its history.






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
