Uncle Joel Wants You

It's summertime, and I know you are all looking for something to do. With budget season upon us, the IPNA Board has seriously considered purchasing fidget-spinners for everyone. But there is a cheaper alternative (for IPNA at least). How about volunteering for the neighborhood? Yes, Uncle Joel wants you. (Nothing creepy about that phrasing.)

There is an awful lot going on in Inman Park. Here are some highlights of the matters pending on the neighborhood's docket.

Transportation: How the City is progressing on our Renew Atlanta Bond-funded projects; how the Complete Streets projects will redesign and improve DeKalb, North Highland and Moreland.

Little Five Points: The pending redesign of Findley Plaza and the needed future work for programming on and maintenance of the Plaza; preserving or improving Bass Field; ongoing safety and quality of life issues in the Little Five area.

Springvale Park: Dealing with the fallout from the recent mudslide; implementing the final phases of the park's improvement plan; fundraising for these goals.

Sidewalks: Ramping up our commitment to repairing broken sidewalks and advocating for the City to fix the sidewalks on City land.

Freedom Park: Working with the Freedom Park Conservancy as it enters into an important master planning process.

Filming: Developing a code of conduct for production companies that film in our neighborhood and advocating with the City for better laws on the subject and for better enforcement of existing laws.

By-laws: Updating and improving the neighborhood's Constitution.

Candidate Forums: This is an extraordinary municipal election cycle, with open seats to be filled for both Mayor and our city council district. In October the neighborhood will be hosting two candidate forums—one for the Mayor's race and the other for City Council District 2. We will have a chance to ask crucial questions, like whether the proper plural of forum is forums or


In addition to these matters, the neighborhood is continuing with all of its usual business, such as running a security patrol, supporting our public schools, making the neighborhood an attractive lifelong community, monitoring development (presently the big one is the proposal we will consider this month for 320 N. Highland Avenue), and putting on the world's best neighborhood festival.

All of this happens because we are a vital neighborhood with so many committed neighbors who volunteer their time and talents. Yet I know there are many more people who haven't been involved but would like to be. It can be difficult—even intimidating—to figure out how. Well, fear not! IPNA will be hosting a Volunteer Fair on Thursday, September 21. The Fair will be a great, big Inman Park party with information about how to get involved in whatever ways appeal to you. I hope you will plan to attend and to volunteer.

Who is "Joel" referenced above? Inman Park was the brainchild of renaissance thinker Joel Hurt (1850-1926), who modeled the neighborhood after other trolley neighborhoods he had seen throughout the United States. In particular, Hurt, who now has Hurt Street named after him, had been impressed with the park-like neighborhoods created by famed landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted, and along with landscape architect James Forsyth Johnson, plotted Inman Park in the late 1880s.

Neighborhood Meeting Highlights: What you missed...



IPNA, July 19, 2017 meeting at The Trolley Barn:

- Regan Hammond gave updates on Renew Atlanta and the plans for 3 upcoming projects: Euclid and Edgewood, Krog Street and Lake Avenue and North Highland Avenue from Alaska Avenue to Elizabeth Street.
- Little 5 Points Halloween Parade Permit was approved for October 21, 2017.
- Anna Foote from the Atlanta Commercial Improvement District came to discuss Findley Plaza and Bass Fields. Residents strongly voiced their desire to maintain Bass Fields as green space where kids can play instead of developing the land into a parking deck or other structure.
- The Lifelong Inman Park Plan was amended with a unanimous vote and then approved.
- The August 16 IPNA meeting will review the application submitted for a commercial redistricting of the Villa de Grip property across the street from Sotto Sotto. They want to go from residential to commercial and add two buildings which would include restaurant space, office space, and a parking garage.



Herzog, and Mary Ruden have each proposed monumental sculptures to add to the landscape of the Atlanta BeltLine trail.

"Art on the Atlanta BeltLine is growing, and nothing captures the spirit of culture and connectivity of the Atlanta BeltLine like the work of artists both local and from around the globe," said Paul Morris, President and CEO of Atlanta BeltLine, Inc.

The exhibition kicks off with the annual Lantern Parade, created by and featuring Chantelle Rytter and the Krewe of the Grateful Gluttons. The Lantern Parade occurs the Saturday after Labor Day each year and will begin at 8:15 p.m. on September 9, 2017 at the Irwin Street entrance of the Eastside Trail.

"The City of Atlanta is proud to support Art on the Atlanta BeltLine in its eighth year," said Camille Russell Love, Executive Director of the Mayor's Office of Cultural Affairs (OCA). "The linear exhibition represents the best of the city's character and welcomes artistic talent from near and far."

Art on the Atlanta BeltLine is presented by Ponce City Market. Additional support is provided by MailChimp, Cox Conserves, Turner, and Kroger. The Lantern Parade is presented by Cox Conserves and Wellstar Atlanta Medical Center, with additional support provided by Ponce City Market.



Have you more or less given up on the movies? Are you tired of wasting a Saturday night on a half hour of commercials and two hours of explosions at the multiplex?


Instead, how about watching a quality movie and then discussing it in a friendly atmosphere – with good food? Film buffs in southeast Atlanta have been doing just that once a month for the last eleven years in Life is Too Short to Watch Lousy Movies. The group is open to new participants on a space-available basis and will soon be signing up regulars for its 2018 season.

Life is Too Short... screens classics as well as more modern films on the second Saturday of every month. So far this year they have watched radical Cary Grant battle conservative Ronald Coleman over the law and Jean Arthur in *The Talk of the Town* (1942), sympathized with hapless Griffin Dunne as he pursues beguiling Rosanna Arquette down the SoHo rabbit hole in Martin Scorsese's dark comedy After Hours (1985), and discovered the origin of the Las Vegas standard "Mack the Knife" in Bertolt Brecht, Kurt Weill, and G.W. Pabst's *The Threepenny Opera* (1931), among others.

Looking ahead, for Halloween they'll screen a classic French thriller, and for the holidays they'll show two films – one comedy, one drama – that explore ultimate values.

The group meets in a private home in Ormewood Park. While they average a dozen or so attendees at each screening, they do expect to have a few openings for 2018. Regular participation with guaranteed seating and space-available participation are both available. There is no charge for the movies or the programs, which usually include coming attractions, a cartoon, and clips from other films or documentaries. The group is run by longtime neighborhood resident and film buff Steve Whiteman.





Because the evening is more than just a "movie night," new people should have a look at the group's website,

Then if they would like to be notified of future films they can sign up for the mailing list as a spaceavailable Drop-In participant on the Contact Us page of the site. 

Walk to End Alzheimer's

My mother is one of 3 million in the United States who suffers from Alzhemier's disease. In her honor, I host a team for the Alzheimer's Association 5K Walk each year. This year the walk is on September 16th. My team name is "For The Love of San" dedicated to the woman I'm slowly losing.

It never dawned on me the things we take for granted until now; like someone saying "I love you" or "Good morning" or even calling your name. Every time I look into my mother's face, I wish those words would come out of her mouth; hell, any words. I wish I could hear, "Daughter, I love you" or "I'm proud of you." Anything! The head nods and teary eyes don't do it for me. I know I sound selfish. She is trying, right?

Sometimes I feel the grief from watching her fade away will suffocate me. I almost feel it will snuff me out like Alzheimer's does the light in her eyes. Grief swallows me like dementia swallows her. It has devoured every recognizable piece of her until the only thing that's left is this shell of a person who doesn't speak, wears diapers and can't do anything for herself. "Where is she?" I wonder. Where is the woman who raised me? Where is the woman with the fire, the sass, the spunk? Where is the woman who wiped my tears, calmed my fears and often brought be back to reality? Losing my mother to Alzheimer's is tragic.

Alzheimer's is the 6th leading cause of death in the United States, and the only cause of death in the Top 10 that cannot be prevented, cured or slowed down. Now that I look back, I saw the signs in my mother for years, but I just assumed it was old age. She would call, asking me how to spell certain words, even the easy ones. Then, she started getting lost going to places she had been to dozens of times. I kept telling myself I would buy her a GPS and never did. I only knew about a few of her instances getting lost, but there were many other times.

According to the Alzheimer's Association, there are several early warning signs of development. These include:

- 1) Memory loss that disrupts daily life
- 2) Challenges in planning or solving problems
- 3) Difficulty completing familiar tasks
- 4) Confusion with time or place
- 5) Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships
- 6) New problems with words in speaking or writing
- 7) Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps



- 8) Decreased or poor judgment
- 9) Withdrawal from work or social activities
- 10) Changes in mood and personality

My single greatest regret is that I didn't appreciate my mother while I had the chance. I didn't call her enough or spend enough time with her. If you are lucky enough to still have a loving mother, appreciate her while you can today because tomorrow may be too late.

If you are concerned someone may be at risk, please get them checked by a doctor for treatment options. Drug and non-drug treatments may help with both cognitive and behavioral symptoms. Researchers are looking for new treatments to alter the course of the disease and improve the quality of life for people with dementia. 
