President's Message

Giving Thanks to the Festival, Trolley Barn and L5PCAC

Every April as I watch Festival unfold, I take a moment to reflect on all the volunteer hours, blood, sweat, and tears that go into making it possible and I give thanks for being able to be a part of this community. The Festival is the defining feature of our neighborhood. Next year we will be celebrating 50 years of Festival! If you have never made time to volunteer in the past, I recommend you mark your calendars for the last weekend of April 2022 so you can be a part of the half century celebration.

Of course, the Festival isn't the only thing that makes Inman Park special. In the context of this continuing pandemic, I am especially grateful that we have two great assets in the neighborhood: The Trolley Barn and the Little 5 Points Center for Arts and Community (formerly the Little 5 Points Community Center.) Each institution has partnered with CORE (Community Organized Relief Effort) and Fulton County to provide Covid testing and Covid vaccines. They have each worked with the American Red Cross to conduct urgently needed blood drives. The convenience and adept management that each organization employed in carrying out these services has taken some of the stress out of what has been a very taxing year. Please remember that these institutions didn't just emerge by accident, they were created by neighbors who were willing to invest their time and often their own money for the benefit of our community. We'd all be poorer in spirit today had the buildings been demolished or sold off for strictly private use.

As we slowly, cautiously emerge from Covid isolation, I encourage you to explore the many great offerings that L5PCAC and the Trolley Barn provide. L5PCAC hosts Horizon Theater, Gateway mime and mask performances, the Atlanta Jugglers, Rising Phoenix T'ai Chi, and many other unique arts groups including the incomparable Seed and Feed Marching Abominable! The Trolley Barn is partnering with Fever to provide candlelight concerts on the patio through most of the summer (and perhaps beyond).

Sometime in the next several months, the IPNA meeting will leave Zoom and return to our home at the Trolley Barn. I hope to see you there!




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Tours have been adjusted for Covid safety and are largely outside. Masks are mandatory, except when eating.

In which Yr. Editrix corners a gardener and asks a few dumb questions. This month's Cornered Gardener is Carolyn Jordan-White of Virgil Street!

Yr. Editrix: What is this palm tree called? Carolyn Jordan-White: Windmill palm. YE: It survives in this climate. Would you say it thrives in this climate? CJW: What's been amazing is that it survived after the tree planted over it died. It used to have an enormous tree over it. So you see it gets these little brown edges on it. It's more sun than it really would prefer.

YE: Carolyn, why do you have peonies and I don't have peonies?

CJW: Your yard has a lot of tree roots, as do a lot of Inman Park yards. I think that's hard for plants to compete for space and nutrients. We're really not the ideal peony climate. They grow well farther north— Michigan, Wisconsin. They like that cool.

We get a little too hot too quick. But we get a nice blast for a little while. They just smell so wonderful I thought it was worth it.

YE: What would you say is the biggest risk of planting a food crop in your front yard? CJW: Well that's where my sun is so that's why I do it! If I had sun in the back I'd probably do it in the back. It's probably not ideal. I'd like to think people who walk their dogs pull them back from...

YE: Peeing actively on food that's being grown? CJW: Yes.

YE: What's your favorite thing blooming right now?

CJW: Snapdragons! And the peonies. This blue salvia. And the clematis! Lettuce. The cilantro is dying back. Arugula is dying back. It's getting hot. We're in the transition period—it's time to figure out what to change in the holes that are going to happen when everybody gets too hot. What's going to come up next.

Speak for the Trees: Words to Live By

I used to teach a seminar at Agnes Scott College called "Trees and Forests." It sounds like ecology, doesn't it? In fact, it was a lit course.



The reading list reached from Greek tragedy to Shakespeare to Janisse Ray, the Georgia essayist and naturalist. My premise was that we can't tell our story — the story of humankind, I mean — without telling the story of the forest, too. They're intertwined.

Think about it: we humans began clearing the forest when we finally settled down to plant crops and build cities. The forest, our onetime home, became scary wilderness. It was where the Big Bad Wolf licked his chops as he waited for Little Red Riding Hood to come skipping down the trail.

City good, forest bad. And yet one of the oldest works of literature already sees a problem. The hero of the epic poem Gilgamesh travels with his friend to the Cedar Forest and slays the terrible giant whom the gods had appointed to protect it. Now the men are free to cut the trees and float them downriver to their city. So far, so typical. Yet as the story continues, we see how this heroic adventure leads to the death of the friend and a crisis for the hero.

We should read Gilgamesh as a cautionary tale. The city and the forest have to find a way to coexist. Nature is not our enemy, but neither is it like the dog someone dresses up in a cable-knit sweater. In Inman Park, we're fortunate to live amid a very distant relative of that legendary Cedar Forest — let's choose to be its ally, not its adversary.




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What a Great Quasi Festival

IPNA Meeting Minutes: April 21, 2021

President Amy Higgins called the IPNA meeting to order at 7:31 p.m.

[Note: between 7:31 and 9:06, the number of participants varied, beginning with 38 people at the start of the meeting, and with a high of around 53 people logged on at 8:17]

Welcome/Introduction of newcomers

Sarah Segan and Brad Oppenheimer (Dixie), Sara Martin Henderson (Edgewood), Alex Ganim (Alta).

Police officers' report – Sgt Moody reported that the officers are no longer on extended 12 hours shifts; they are back to the usual 8-hour shifts, which will make officers more available for Security Patrol. In Zone 6, all crime is down in the last 28 days, with robberies in particular down 14%. Q: Any updates on street racing? Are the incidents declining or holding steady? A: They have made a lot of arrests and impounded a lot of cars.

Minutes of last meeting: Motion to approve March Meeting Minutes. Seconded. Approved

Announcements

Our District 2 Atlanta City Councilmember Amir Farokhi and his wife Julie welcomed their first child, baby girl Kanako Elizabeth Okada-Farokhi. (Inman Park butterfly gifts are on the way!) Darcel Stewart reported that Transportation Committee reviewed has met and will give a full report next month on noise abatement initiatives, among other items. She reminded membership that "Quiet your Ride" signs can be purchased here: https://locations. theupsstore.com/ga/decatur/2107-n-decatur-rd/sign-printing Barbara Leach (Chair of Beautification Committee) reported that the new "Welcome to Inman Park" signs will be installed just after the Tour of Gardens. The 5 wooden signs that were designed by neighbor Curt Wilson 20 years ago have been stolen or in disrepair; 3 of those are available for purchase in the ToG Auction April 19-26. In February IPNA voted to set aside \$2,500 to update the design and replace the signs.

Elected officials' reports – Jay Tribby was present on behalf of Amir Farokhi's office and reported that discussions and a vote to repurpose the city jail have been happening recently: https:// citycouncil.atlantaga.gov/Home/Components/News/News/2504/ Also, all 110 MARTA bus routes (curtailed by Covid-19) will be restored by 4/24. Most service in Inman Park will stay the same. Q: Why is the new Tree Ordinance not going in front of the NPUs first? A: Not sure; will ask Legislative Director Tony Lucadamo for clarification on that and will follow up.

City of Atlanta Tree Ordinance - Jim Abbot (Inman Park Tree Watch and Arboretum) gave a brief update on the new Tree Ordinance. This is a basic need and right of Atlanta residents, affecting our clean air and water. He has attended many meetings and reviewed many documents since this process began, and is pleased to see the City reach out and incorporate ideas from the community. In many ways this new Ordinance is much improved over the 20-year-old version (for example, actual tree-removal companies will be involved and consulted). He does believe this will protect more trees, and in general hopes Inman Park will show our support for the proposal, but contingent on some changes needed; Trees Atlanta should work with the City to achieve these basic goals:

No net loss of trees

• Goal of 50% tree canopy (currently 47%)

• Broaden the category of "Priority Tree" to include more species (e.g., native trees)

• More transparent use of the trust fund

• Involve the community; more time to appeal before a tree comes down

Motion to support the City's proposal for a new tree protection ordinance, with the request that the City Council work with Trees Atlanta to adopt as many of its suggestions as possible. Second. Unanimous agreement.

Q: Does this new variance and setback (80%) make it more difficult for developers? A: It relies on the "professional judgement" of the City, which could be problematic. Q: Could we add/ request language for minimum footage or to reduce the setback? A: We can propose this. Members decided that "Overall we are encouraged by many provisions but have concerns about administrative setbacks variance and involvement with immediate neighbors on contiguous properties impacted."

Motion to not support the stand-alone provision of Ordinance as currently written (allowing administrative variances to reduce required building setbacks by 80% to preserve trees. Consensus was a possible 80% in required yard width was excessive) Second. Unanimous agreement.

PAD introduction and discussion - delayed until May meeting

Little 5 Points Alliance – Cristy Lenz, Chris Curley and Al Caproni gave a brief update on some items:

There is an active Safety Committee working to figure out initiatives

• The Mini Precinct has closed; may be opened in new location at some point

• The Findley Plaza improvement project has been bundled into two other city projects and will begin work in the first quarter of next year

Safety on Colquitt – Neighbors Doug Alvarez and Joan Steigerwald presented concerns with the shared driveway which runs behind businesses on Euclid in L5P and exits on Colquitt. Cars exiting the parking lot too fast often endanger pedestrians, too many cars parked tightly along the lane force vehicles up onto neighbors' yards, lack of marked parking creates confusion in the lot, etc. Q: What are you proposing? A: Open to suggestions, but thinking about wildcat striping, speedbumps or bollards to calm traffic. Q: Is this area included in the L5P Alliance Mobility Study? A: (Curley) Yes, in the parking analysis section. The confusion in this "unmanaged" parking lot comes because several businesses own different portions of it.

Politicians' event and budget allocation vote – The IPNA Board recently approved \$1,800 to be used for an Elected Officials Event ("IPNA Winner's Circle") which will occur on Saturday 4/24 when the Inman Park Festival Parade would have started. This political celebration was organized by the Diversity and Inclusivity Committee, who is excited to keep the momentum going," in a year where we could not have a Parade because of Covid. The funds will be primarily used for security and to livestream the event on the Inman Park Facebook page.

IPNA officers' reports:

President Amy Higgins introduced a request from neighbors Jim Emshoff and John Dwyer to remove the broken pavers on Euclid/ Edgewood in Delta Park and replace temporarily with mulch to make that area accessible to audiences viewing live music in that area during the 2022 Festival. The cost would be \$350, to be taken from the General Fund. Q: Isn't that area part of a larger project of improvement stated to begin later? A: Yes, but that is not yet scheduled and this quick fix is needed. Q: Do we need approval from the Parks Department? A: This may get their attention and speed up true repairs.

Motion to support the allocation. Second. Unanimous approval.

VP of Historic Preservation - Sara Wittich introduced architect Ute Banse, who presented on behalf of the owners the proposed changes to 776 Dixie Avenue, which will require a type 3 certificate of appropriateness. This is mostly an interior renovation, but they plan to also expand the existing, finished attic and add two dormers which will be visible from the street. Q: How did immediate neighbors respond to this proposal? A: Immediate neighbors and the Historic Preservation Committee all unanimously approved. Motion to support. Second. Unanimous approval.

VP for Zoning - Regina Brewer presented a request from one of the the new owners of Pure Taqueria for a change of agent (from previous owner) for liquor license. The immediate neighbors all supported this request. Motion to support. Second. Unanimous approval. Regina then gave an update on 320 North Highland (Villa de Grip), which a judge recently rezoned to a commercial classification (MRC-I-C) Amir helped negotiate this compromise, and the City Council voted to approve with two conditions: 1. Lifting the condition prohibiting commercial use above the main level 2. Widening the driveway to allow 24' width for two-way traffic. The Copenhill lot remains residential. We suspect that the owners wish to demolish the existing building but that would be very difficult to legally do. Q: Does this mean the design process now starts over? A: Yes. VP of Public Safety – Kevin Curry – reported that we are hiring a new officer to fill an evening shift

Treasurer - Kay Kirsche – reported that there is \$125k in operating account and \$150k in reserves. \$34k will be spent soon on sidewalk repairs. Q: What is the status/timeline of that project? A: Will reach out to Millie Astin and ask.

VP for Communications - Melissa Miller - nothing to report

Secretary - Julie Noble - nothing to report

Scott Evans, NPU-N – reported on new legislation proposed to allow onsite sales from urban gardens. There is a presentation later this month and he will report back with more info in May.

Committee Reports – Eric Goldberg (Chair of the Inman Park Education Committee) reported, regarding APS future use of the empty Inman Middle building, that there have been several meetings (APS-wide on 3/30 and two neighborhood specific meetings on 2/24 and 4/14) The EdComm will be putting out a document with data and neighborhood-wide survey on this topic soon and will host another meeting in May.


