President's Message

Here's to 2023!

Happy New Year! It's a new year in the neighborhood and time to look forward to all that is ahead for our neighborhood and our city. Here are some of the things the Inman Park Neighborhood Association and our committees are working on:

We've established a committee for BeltLine Rail, in keeping with our longtime support of BeltLine Rail. In 2016 we worked with the developers of The Edge, the apartment community on the Beltline, to maintain room for the rail during its development. We also voted as a neighborhood to support BeltLine Rail last year. Many residents are excited about BeltLine Rail and how the increased connectivity will bring less car traffic to the neighborhood while giving people more options to leave their cars behind. Others are worried there could be added noise and a possible street closure. Our committee will work with residents and city and BeltLine officials to increase understanding and impact the project where we can. We're always strongest when we work together.

Improved sidewalks will also be coming to the neighborhood. The IPNA Planning VP, Matt Cherry, and Sidewalk Chair, Millie Austin, are working with Lake Ave. residents to bring new sidewalks from Ashland Ave to Hale St. along Lake. We've gotten bids and hope to get the work started as soon as we can. Our City Councilman, Amir Farokhi, is also working to fund sidewalks in our neighborhood. At the December meeting he asked for areas in our neighborhood that needed improvement and residents responded. We look forward to increased walkability in 2023.

The Historic Preservation Committee plans to update our historical regulations. We'll have a broader conversation about this as we delve into the process more in 2023. We've hired a consultant to help us with this update. One of the items we're discussing is whether or not to add brushed sidewalks as an option. Brushed sidewalks are the square concrete sidewalks you see around the city and there are some in our neighborhood. Our current historic regulations allow for hexagonal pavers, brick, or stamped hexagonal concrete. We'll have more discussions as we move forward. Any changes to our current historical regulations will go before the neighborhood for a vote. More to come.

We're also working on the brick triangle park at Druid







Circle and Edgewood, and Gordon Park at Virgil and Ashland. We hope to make both of these spaces into something the whole community can enjoy. Once we have plans for these areas we'll discuss and vote as a neighborhood.

It will be April before you know it and with that comes our 51st Inman Park Festival and Tour of Homes April 28, 29 & 30th (also known as the best weekend of 2023!!!) We look forward to the unveiling of the 2023 Festival design and our February Volunteer Fair. More than 60 residents (even some past residents!) are on the Festival committee under Festival Chair, Kila Posey. They plan for the Festival year-round from sponsorships to Tour of Homes, from the Parade to marketing and volunteering. It takes a volunteer village to plan such a large undertaking as Festival. Over Festival weekend It takes over 900 volunteers to keep it running smoothly. If you haven't volunteered before please sign-up when one of your neighbors asks! We need all neighborhood residents to pitch in at least one or two 2-hour shifts to help make Festival a success!

Cheers to a great 2023 together!

Cotton Fields

Every fall across the cotton belt, rural roads are littered with fluffy white cotton bolls and raw cotton lint; they are scattered during the cotton harvest. Here in Inman Park, we don't see cotton bolls along the curbs, but the cotton economy played an important role in the lives of many early residents.

Strolling around the neighborhood, you can catch a glimpse of the soaring brick towers of Fulton Bag

and Cotton
Mills and
the rustic
granite
exterior of
the Virginia
Cotton
Docks. And
the historic
houses
here are
cues to the
personal
stories of

the people who lived when cotton was vital. There are no signs noting that a Civil War blockade runner lived here or a son of Alabama's Blackland Prairie cotton belt. No notice that several men moved here from Columbus - the pre-1860 center for milling cotton at the fall line of the Chattahoochee River. While the trains and the railroad propelled the

City of Atlanta's growth, there was a strong connection to the cotton economy among prominent early residents of Inman Park.

Located south of the Georgia Railroad line in Cabbagetown, the Fulton Bag and Cotton Mill complex was expanded in 1881. Steam-powered mills could be built away from the fall line. The Virginia Cotton Docks on the Beltline near Irwin Street was where cotton from the mill was stored. Cotton was the state's major cash crop from the late 18th century into the 20th century. Before the invention of the cotton gin, cotton production was confined to the coastal plain. The only type grown for


profit was the long-staple cotton that was grown off the coast on the Sea Islands. The difficulty of removing

seeds from short-staple cotton had made commercial production unprofitable. Cotton was an insignificant specialty crop in 1790. That year the entire South produced only 1.5 million pounds - most of which was long-staple cotton. In 1860, the Southern growers produced an astonishing 2.28 billion pounds of cotton.

The cotton gin allowed the profitable processing of short-staple cotton, which could be grown in the upland and cooler regions of Georgia. Unfortunately, this increased the demand for enslaved workers and led to the forcible removal of native peoples from their land.

James and Mary Elizabeth Hurt Jones built the original Hurt residence on Elizabeth Street near Edgewood as a farmhouse. Mary Elizabeth, from Columbus, GA, was a first cousin of Joel Hurt's father, and she sold Joel Hurt the land where Inman Park was developed. It is possible cotton was grown here in Inman Park at one time; the Joneses did cultivate cotton on land further south in the coastal plain near Augusta.


On Waverly Way is the house Aaron Haas built in 1907. A member of one of Atlanta's founding Jewish

families, Mr. Haas was a cotton merchant who sold cotton during the Civil War to help finance the Confederate cause and even crewed blockade runner ships. A big part of the Confederate war strategy was leveraging the value of their cotton crop. While running a blockade en route to England with a cargo of cotton in 1863, he was captured, but he escaped by bribing a guard. (I have not found primary sources to confirm the blockade-running story, but it certainly captured my imagination!)

On Elizabeth Street at Euclid is the large home built in 1904 by Joel Hurt, who developed Inman Park. Hurt was born and raised near Columbus in the famous Blackland Prairie cotton-growing region of Alabama. When Joel Hurt was born in 1850, there were already five textile mills in nearby Columbus - then called the "the Lowell of the South". While never a resident here, Samuel Martin Inman was an investor in Hurt's plan for Inman Park and was also a prominent cotton merchant.



Also on Edgewood are two homes built by the Winship brothers, Robert and Charles. Their foundry, the Winship Machine Company, was destroyed at the end of the Civil War and was rebuilt to thrive again - this time as a manufacturer of cotton gins.

The Atlanta Preservation Center conducts walking tours of Inman Park, focusing on its historic houses. I was introduced to these histories by Jan Keith's APC tour. You can reserve a spot here: https://www.atlantapreservationcenter.com/inman_park

maybe even in the south (ha!). The warmer weather helped




While this

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IPNA Meeting Minutes: December 21, 2022

Called to order 7:31p, 19 participants ZOOM ONLY

Welcome/Introduction of newcomers - None. Police officers' report -Ltn Nawin Capell: Commander of Morning Watch for Zone 6. He is new to Zone 6. Been with Dept for about 23 years, recently promoted. Will be providing support.

- Crime for the 28 day report, we are down in all areas. Zone 6 is down 8% in all crime. For the 28 day report for Inman Park, there have been 45 reported crimes, areas with off leash dogs, let Amir majority are property crimes like break-ins and auto thefts around Highland and L5P.
- auto theft. Flaw in vehicles, easy to steal.
- Clean Car Campaign firearms are typically targeted. Park in well-lit areas. Encourage enrollment in connectatlanta. org. 10,000 cameras are currently enrolled and very helpful for solving enforcement on Sinclair- Amir crimes.

Q: Question about dogs off leash in park. Neighbor was attacked/ approached by two pit bulls off leash. She was wondering if she sprays an approaching dog with a deterrent spray, can she get in trouble? A: No, not if you are being threatened or attacked.

Q: Plaza Theater/FedEx Shooting incident – any updates on young woman shot by road rage? A: She is in stable condition. Unfortunately, there have recently been a lot of these incidents stemming from road rage. If you are involved in a driving confrontation or potential road rage, don't acknowledge the incident, don't honk, etc. Would recommend looking into aftermarket dash cam, getting more popular.

was great. If you participated in the photo booth, we received the photos digitally. Will be putting the photos or a link on the IPNA site for neighbors to download photos digitally.

Membership allows you to vote (see bylaws online for details), gives you access to the directory and makes you eligible for special neighborhood events. In addition to being a member of IPNA, you may register for the Inman Park Security Patrol (IPSP) which staffs off-duty Atlanta Police officers to patrol our neighborhood. There are four levels of commitment beginning at \$50 per year. IPNA meetings are held at 7:30 p.m. on the 3rd Wednesday of each month at the Trolley Barn. IPSP membership is based upon a rolling annual membership term. Your renewal date is one year from your membership date and again every year after that.





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
