I love to work the Tour of Homes and spend two hours sitting on a beautiful porch while checking folks' tickets at the door or slinging beers at the beer tent to thirsty festival goers. An ice cold post-shift beer is the tastiest brew to ever cross your lips. Hoppy crispness. Ahhh! Sorry, I got lost in the moment.

We need roughly 800 volunteers to fill all the necessary slots to make festival a seamless experience that will bring folks back year after year.

As a volunteer you are part of the festival instead of just a bystander. Better yet, encourage your friends to volunteer too, and enjoy the festival together after your volunteer shifts.

# Fire in the Woods

An old family friend, Caniff Hodson, once told me about his parents' rigorous journey overland from Jacksonville in a covered wagon. In 1901 the Hodsons had traveled 250 miles westward through the longleaf pine forest. They drove off-road - in their canvas-topped, horse-drawn wagon. This journey was possible because the longleaf pine ecosystem does not have a thick understory of shrubs and small trees. Frequent burning in this system creates a longleaf-wiregrass savanna.

Caniff, a beekeeper by trade, lived very close to this natural system. He knew that the ordered plantations of slash pine (Pinus elliottii), now ubiquitous, were no replacement for the longleaf pine ecosystem. Gone were the blackberries and dewberries with their white and pink



spring blooms and hundreds of other plant species found nowhere else. The longleaf system is home to the now-endangered Red-cockaded woodpecker, the "gopher" (Gopher Tortoise), the Indigo snake and the Fox squirrel.

Hunters seek out the Bobwhite quail and the white-tailed deer. There are more than 68 species of birds, 900 plant species and 30 native butterflies here.

The native peoples of Georgia and the Southeast had managed this enormous ecosystem with fire for thousands of years. They used fire to encourage plants attractive to game animals and to make clearings for hunting. Wildfires caused by summer lightning also worked to maintain the ecosystem. Lightning fires burned uncontained over large areas and might burn for weeks.

The early British settlers in the Southeast were very familiar with using fire to manage a landscape. The peoples of the north and west of Britain had used fire to manage the heathland and moorland for over 8,000 years. Locals in the Southeast U.S. call it "burning the woods". But we know this does not mean an intense high-fuel burn that would kill the trees, Burning the woods means a light maintenance burn. Because there isn't much to burn, it moves along the ground quickly. Fire destroys other pine species and hardwoods which could eventually shade out and replace the longleaf pines. Longleaf seeds do best when they can put down roots directly in the bare soil made available by burning.

In coastal Georgia and Florida, large areas of the longleaf ecosystem were maintained as grazing land for cattle and feral hogs. That, in combination with its remote location, helps explain why some of the largest remnants of the ecosystem are located there. Livestock ranged free in Georgia and Florida until the mid-twentieth century.

When Hernan de Desoto reached Georgia's Flint River in 1540, there were as many as 90 million acres of longleaf pine forest. The longleaf forest extended from Virginia down the Atlantic coast, across southern Georgia to the Gulf of Mexico, and westward to Texas. When my friend Caniff and I spoke in 1972, it had been reduced by more than 95%. In Georgia today, half a million acres remain - most of it on private land.

Over the centuries, many enterprises exploited the longleaf pine trees. In Virginia in the 1700s, the tree was used for its lumber and resin. The floor of George Washington's home, Mount Vernon, was constructed using it. Many historic homes have longleaf pine floors, and for a time, the majority of the houses built in the South used this lumber. Longleaf is harder than other pine wood and longleaf heart pine wood is even harder. In Virginia, naval stores were extracted as early as 1608 – when John Smith exported the first "tryalls of Pitch and Tarre". Pitch, tar, turpentine, and resin – were used to caulk seams and maintain wooden ships. Producing naval stores was vital to the South's economy for centuries. Over time these two industries exhausted vast areas of the longleaf.

In 1932 a new chemical process accelerated the removal of the longleaf pine. A new method using an acidic sulfite solution to digest the pine wood allowed its use in paper manufacturing. Landowners throughout the Southeast planted the fast-growing slash pine for paper production, and pulp mills appeared all over the South. Investors from outside the region also bought land for this purpose. The St Joe Paper Company alone had title to over a million acres of land in the Florida Gulf region.

Robert Woodruff lived in Inman Park in the early years. Before joining the

Coca-Cola Company in 1923, he hunted with his employer Walter White, one of the owners of the White Motor Company of Cleveland, Ohio. They hunted in a significant patch of the longleaf forest which remained intact north of Tallahassee on private quail reserves. Six years later, he and Walter White bought several old cotton farms and created a 29,000-acre quailhunting reserve near Albany, Georgia. This reserve embraced holistic forest and wildlife management, including prescribed fire, to maintain the diversity of the longleaf pine ecosystem.

Today, much of Georgia's longleaf forest is on private land, making it vulnerable to pressure from development. Even properties that have willingly planted longleaf seedlings might choose to harvest those trees when they grow to a marketable size. These pines can grow to more than 100 feet. Old-growth specimens can be 30 inches in diameter.

There is one longleaf pine tree in Inman Park; it's in Freedom Park, south of North Highland Avenue. It is opposite a stand of shortleaf pines - allowing us to compare the length of the needles and the size of the cones. Longleaf pine needles can be well over a foot long. They're bundled at the tip of a bare stem, giving the longleaf pine a distinctive appearance. Its cones can be more than ten inches long. Nearby is a group of the shortleaf pine (Pinus echinata) which is much more common in the Piedmont. This pine has shorter needles, about 6 inches long, and the cones are about 4 inches long. Please pay close attention to the street closing and remove your cars from the streets prior to the closing in order to avoid being towed.

Closed Friday, Saturday, Sunday: The following streets/areas will close on Friday, April 28th at 7:00 a.m. and reopen on Sunday, April 30th at 10:00 p.m. Cars must be off the street in this area by 7:00 a.m. on Friday, April 28th or they will be towed:

Transportation Inside the Festival Footprint – Personal Golf Carts, Skateboards, Scooters, and Bicycles

Personal Golf carts, skateboards, scooters and bicycles are not allowed in the Inman Park Festival footprint during Festival hours. Personal golf carts will be allowed on Friday night (April 28nd) for Butterfly Ball and Saturday night (April 29rd) after 7 pm for Theater Night.

Please note: it is illegal to drive a golf cart on public streets open to traffic. Festival security will stop any golf cart with an unlicensed driver or anyone driving under the influence.

FESTIVAL GOLF CART POLICIES AND RULES For safety and insurance purposes, the polices and rules established in 2019 regarding Festival Golf Carts remain in effect. See details below:

1. Only official Festival staff carts will be allowed inside the Festival footprint. These carts will all be marked with signs in front and in back for easy recognition.

2. Staff or volunteers in Festival carts should not transport Festival attendees unless there is an emergency of some kind.

3. Festival golf carts will not be checked-out to anyone under 18 years of age or to anyone without a valid driver's license.

4. If you choose to decorate your cart, make sure that the Festival signs on front and back of the cart are clearly visible to the officers and staff. If not, you will be stopped. Please do not use tape or any attachments that will leave residue or marks on the carts.

5. Personally rented carts will not be allowed in the footprint of the Festival during Festival hours. Taking a cart to Butterfly Ball or to Theater Night is fine as it is after Festival hours. If you rent a personal cart and LIVE within the Festival footprint, you will not be allowed to enter or leave your property with your cart during Festival hours. Park it outside of the footprint (if you want to use it during Festival hours) or on your property if you won't be using it.

6. Traffic laws will be enforced by our officers. This means that the driver of a cart, whether Festival staff or not, within the footprint or not, must have a valid driver's license and must not be intoxicated or driving in a dangerous manner. Our officers will stop drivers who, in their discretion, may not be complying with the law.

## The Legend of Springvale Park's Wrought Iron Fence

This is about the wrought iron fence that runs along both sides of the Euclid Avenue sidewalk above Springvale Park and how two neighbors made it happen.

The original Olmstead design for Springvale Park did not have a road in the middle. By the 1960's the glory days of our neighborhood had passed and folks wanted a faster route downtown. So the elegant lake was drained and Springvale Park was cut in half by an ugly Euclid Avenue land bridge. It was also wrong when Georgia DOT attempted to cut the Inman Park neighborhood in half with an ugly road in the 1980's, but one of Inman Park's leading founding mothers helped stop such nonsense... here's one small episode in the Cathy Bradshaw story.

Around 35 years ago Cathy Bradshaw's 7 year old daughter Jane was riding her bicycle on the Euclid Avenue sidewalk above Springvale Park. Jane lost control, rolled down the hill and

crashed. What followed were tears, some blood, a trip to the emergency room, x-rays, and a lot of worry for her mother. Thankfully Jane made a full recovery. It took a mother's love, and a dear neighbors help, to make those sidewalks safe and prevent a similar tragedy.

Cathy Bradshaw went to work politely requesting, nudging, pushing, and eventually pestering city officials for a safer

sidewalk with a protective fence. She made some progress but was running out of energy raising two children, restoring her home, volunteering for Festivals, working to save the Old Fourth Ward and of course working full time. That's when her friend and neighbor Marge Hays joined her and together they patiently and persistently kept the safety fence project moving forward.

A lovely, unobtrusive and mostly historically accurate wrought iron fence was installed; adding to the list of behind-the-scenes achievements by Cathy and Marge over the years. I've always called it the "Jane Bradshaw Almost Memorial Fence," because the daredevil cyclist survived the crash, and she still lives in our neighborhood. Jane's young son benefits from this safety feature, since it is on the way to his grandparent's home on Hurt Street.

In recent years many of our neighbors have adopted and nurtured this Park. They have cared and maintained and redeveloped Springvale

Park into a beautiful and invaluable urban gem. It has a lake, wonderful playgrounds, a bocce ball court and thanks to Cathy Bradshaw and Marge Hays, it has a wrought iron fence.
